Forest Warden Urges Observance Of Law

Unlawful to Ignite Material Without Securing Permit

Frank V. White, Chowan County Forest Warden, this week calls attention to the law regarding brush burning. He expressed his appreciation for the cooperation he has received in previous years, and said he hoped the same cooperation will be realized this year.

Mr. White pointed out that it is unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to start or cause to be started any fire or ignite any material in any of the areas of woodlands under the protection of the State Forest Service or within 500 feet of any such protected area between the first day of February and the first day of June or between the first day of October and the 30th day of November, in any year, without first obtaining from the State Forester or one of his duly authorized agents, a permit to ignite any material. No charge is made for granting of said permits.

MARINES NEED MEN

Captain M. D. Smith, Jr., director of Marine Corps Recruiting for North Carolina has announced the quota for enlistment in the Marine Corps is unlimited.

To be qualified for enlistment a man must be between the ages of 17 to 29, of good moral character and must be able to pass the mental and physical examinations.

Ex-Marines, who held the rank of Sergeant or below at time of discharge may now re-enlist in the Marine Corps and retain their rank.

Married men without prior Marine Corps Service may enlist in the Marine Corps Reserve and be assigned to active duty immediately.
