

Bankers Sponsor Speaking Contest

Various Prizes Will Be Awarded High School Students

The North Carolina Bankers Association is again sponsoring a speaking contest for all white high school students, grades 9-12. This contest is very similar to those sponsored by the Bankers Association in the past, and should prove to be very interesting and worthwhile to many high school boys and girls of both Edenton and Chowan High Schools.

The subject of the speech for 1951 is "Green Pastures, Their Place in the Economy of North Carolina."

The prizes are as follows:

School Prizes—1st prize, \$10 in cash; 2nd prize, \$5 in cash; 3rd prize, \$2.50 in cash.

County Prizes—\$15.00 in cash.

Regional Prizes—1st prize, \$50 bond; 2nd prize, \$25 bond.

State Prizes—1st prize, \$400 in savings bonds; 2nd prize \$100 in savings bonds; 3rd prize, \$50 in savings bonds.

The dates of the contest are as follows: March 16, 1951, School contest; March 23, 1951, county contest; April 3, for group contest and April 6, for the State contest.

This speaking contest has had many contestants in the past years and much interest has been shown. High school students may obtain additional information from their principal or agricultural teacher.

The 4-H County Council met in the Brown-Carver Library on Saturday morning, February 17 at 11:00 o'clock. William Revells, County Council president, presided over the meeting. The main business had to do with outlining the work for the remainder of the year. The Council went on record to carry forward the following activities:

1. Each club observe National 4-H Club Week, March 3-11, with a program of local 4-H activities and exhibit.
2. Each club enter local clean up campaigns.
3. Each club have one boy's and girl's demonstration team to enter County 4-H Contest.
4. All clubs come together for observance of annual 4-H Church Sunday.

Edenton Police Arrest 69 Persons In January

According to Chief of Police George Dail, 69 persons were arrested by

Edenton police during the month of January, of which number 64 were found guilty. Of these arrested 40 were white males, three white females, 32 colored males and one colored female.

Miscellaneous traffic violations led the arrests with 22, followed by drunks with 20. Fines amounted to \$429.50, costs \$469.85 for a total of \$899.45. Of this amount \$152.45 was turned over to the town in way of officers' fees.

During the month police answered 108 calls, investigated six accidents, worked four funerals, reported 62 street lights out, extended 29 courtesies, found 16 doors unlocked, made 26 investigations, answered three fire calls and issued 391 citations. The police made 604 radio calls and were on the air 53 minutes and 20 seconds.

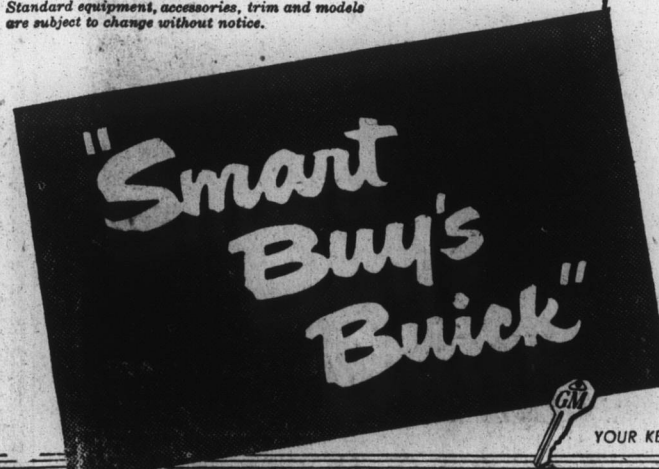
