Temporary Group Named Thursday at Elizabeth City Meeting

Another meeting was held in Elizabeth City Thursday night concerning the organization of an Artificial Breeders Association. At this meeting temporary directors were appointed from Chowan, Perquimans, Pasquotank, Camden and Currituck counties. These directors will be the temporary governing body of the association, and are authorized to collect initiation fees for the organization.

Watson Earl White of Paradise section is the director for Chowan County. Mr. White is very interested in his work and pledges his best effort to the association. Chowan County is fortunate in having him as a director.

There are several artificial breeders' associations throughout the State and farmers are very enthusiastic about them. If a farmer is a member of an association he can breed his cows to some of the best dairy type bulls in the entire nation at a very nominal cost.

Under the proposed set-up for the Albemarle counties the breeding fee will only be \$8.00 per cow plus the \$2.00 initiation fee. The initiation fee applies to all farmers who join the association, and is the same regardless of how many cows the member has. In case a farmer pays \$2.00 to join the association and then disposes of his cow, he is still a member of the association and entitled to breeding services at any time in the future. Once a farmer is a member of the association all that is necessary to get his cows bred is to call the inseminator who will render the necessary services.

One of the greatest advantages of this program is that it prevents the spreading of Bangs Disease. If a herd is free of Bangs and this method is used the owner need not worry about his cows becoming infected unless he buys infected cows from other herds.

There should not be any danger of farmers losing money in an association of this kind, as the \$8.00 breeding fee per cow entitles her to two services at no additional cost. The inseminator will make a third trip at a very nominal cost of possibly \$1.00, and not to exceed \$2.00. The initiation fee is the only deposit that the farmer actually makes until his cow or cows are serviced. The initiation fee will be used to pay for laboratory equipment (microscope, refrigeration, sterilization, etc.).

Chowan County farmers will be

canvassed in the near future and J. H. F. Kearns, Sr., Mrs. J. H. F. Kearns, Jr., and Miss Joyce Moore given an opportunity to pay the initiation fee and join the association. It is hoped that they will take advantage of this opportunity.

2,563 Trucks Stopped In State In February

Of 2,563 trucks stopped by inspectors of the Theft Bureau during February, two per cent were found to be over the road limit and nine per cent had insufficient licenses, the Department of Motor Vehicles reported today.

A total of 1,817 North Carolina trucks and 646 out-of-state trucks

were stopped. Fifty-one of the North Carolina trucks and 13 of the out-of-state vehicles were over the road limit, while 225 North Carolina trucks and 16 out-of-state trucks had insufficient licenses.

Total collections by the inspectors amounted to \$125,738.35. Penalties were \$13,888.70 and the remainder was for additional license fees. On privately-owned trucks, additional license fees totaled \$20,298.53 and penalties \$9,463.22. On Commercial Vehicles, \$91,551.12 in additional license fees and \$4,425.48 in penalties were collected.

Inspectors assisted in recovery of 51 stolen vehicles during February and launched investigation into theft of 25 additional vehicles.
