

Immunization of all children who are to enter school for the first time this fall should be started at once, accerding to Dr. B. B. McGuire, district health officer. State law requires that they be immunized against diphtheria, whooping cough and smallpox.

"Your private doctor will be glad to give all of these, as well as a booster dose for diphtheria and whooping cough if the children were immunized in early childhood," says Dr. McGuire. For those children whose parents
