Wake Forest Trims Edenton Colonials

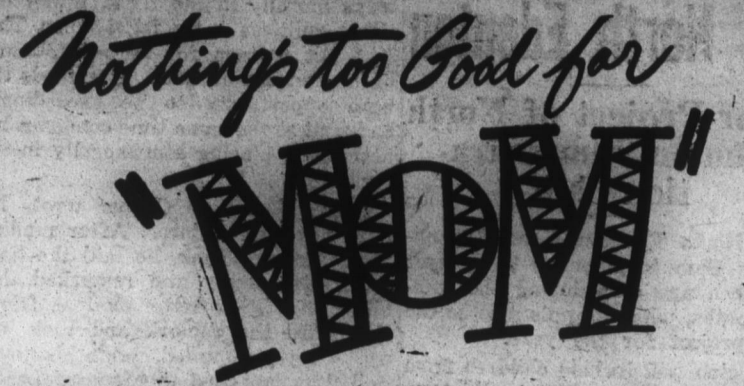
Eller Holds Locals to Three Hits; Lose at New Bern Sunday

Wake Forest's Demon Deacons had little difficulty in defeating Edenton's Colonials in an exhibition game on Hicks Field Saturday night by a score of 11-0. A goodly crowd of fans were on hand to witness Max Eller, Wake Forest hurler, silence the Colonials' bats. Eller allowed only one hit, a double by Manager Gashouse Parker in the fourth inning, until the ninth when Brooks and Griffin singled to net only three hits during the game.

On the other hand, the Deacons chalked up hits in every inning except the fourth. Raines was touched for eight hits in six innings. He was relieved by Holt in the seventh, but the Deacons took a liking to his slants and chalked up nine hits in the three remaining innings, five of which netted runs in the eighth.

The Colonials' fielding was also ragged throughout, which contributed to the Deacons' 11 runs.

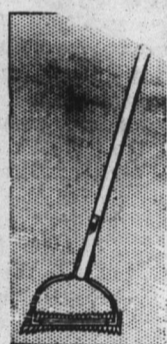

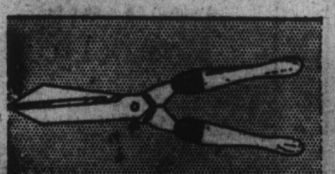
