

Pig Demonstrations In Chowan County

Results Are Gratifying In Other Counties In State

J. K. Butler, Jr., Extension Animal Husbandry specialist, of State College, is conducting several experiments throughout the State in feeding pigs on Vitamin B12 and other Anti-Bioidic Concentrates. On Saturday morning Mr. Butler mixed 3,000 pounds of feed which is to be used in the test in Chowan County. Home Feed & Fertilizer Company in Edenton mixed the concentrates for Mr. Butler. Pig Feeding demonstrations will be conducted with John and Will Bunch, of Route 1, Edenton, and also Carroll and Fahey Byrum, of Route 1, Edenton.

In these tests, 16 pigs of exactly the same age will be fed out from weaning age to market size. Eight of the pigs at each test will be fed without the Anti-Bioidic material added. Mr. Butler has gotten excellent results from similar feeding experiments in other counties and it will be interesting to note the results of same from such demonstrations in Chowan County.

Chairman George Alma Byrum says that volunteer donors are slow in signing up for the May visit of the bloodmobile and he is hoping that between now and May 17, a large number will register and make their donation at the armory.

Records show that the Marines at the nearby station have played an important part in the meeting of the

county's quotas on previous visits. Chairman Byrum praised their cooperation and response to this call high-ly.

Records show that Negroes in the town and county have not taken their full part in this program and an urgent request is made for them to register and to participate in the program.

Byrum reminds prospective donors of the following facts: It doesn't hurt to give a pint of blood. Examinations are given to each volunteer prior to his donation. If for any reason a donor shouldn't give blood, he or she is immediately told about it. It takes only a short time to give this blood. Expert medical attention is at hand for any donor who needs such attention. Refreshments are right on hand.

When the blood leaves Edenton, it

is taken to the blood center in Norfolk and stored. A certain amount of each type blood is deposited at the Chowan Hospital for use FREE OF CHARGE. There is no charge for the actual blood at the hospital. There is a charge only for the laboratory fees in administering the blood. This charge is negligible. Any reports to the contrary are without foundation.

This is a volunteer project for the benefit of citizens here and of our soldiers on the battlefields.

"Don't let just a few do all the giving when it costs nothing and takes only a little bit of your time," says Chairman Byrum. "Support the blood program. Sign up now or drop around at the armory on May 17 and save a life."

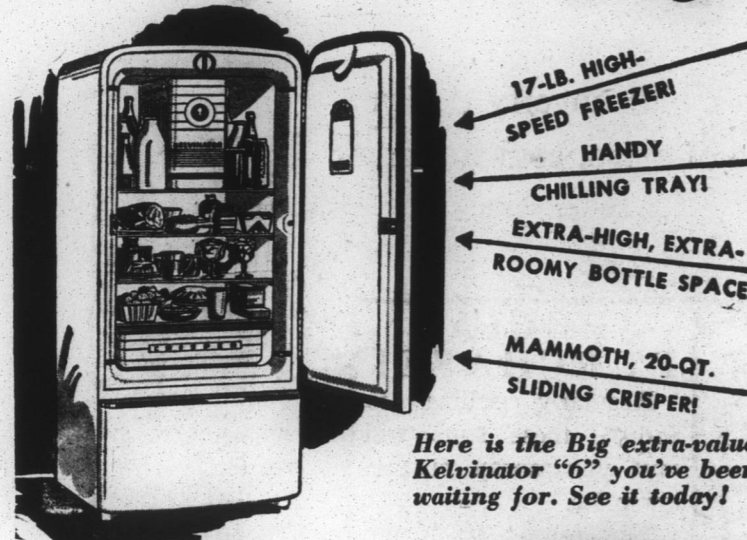

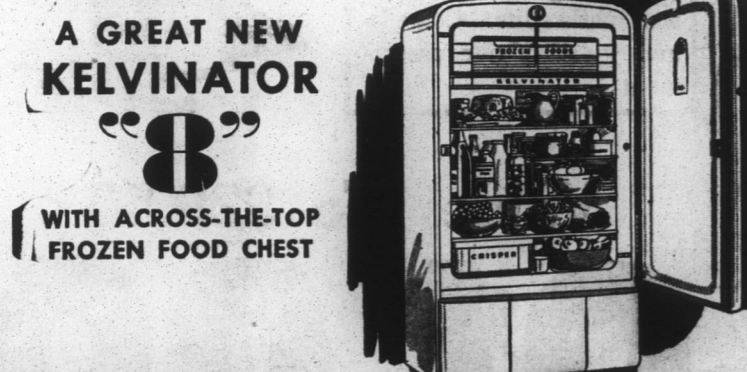
