## **Velfare Program's Changes Discussed At Meeting Here**

Twelve counties were represented Thursday at a meeting held in the Court House, when important changes in North Carolina's public welfare program were discussed. The changes were presented by Dr. Ellen Winston, commissioner of public welfare; Fannie Memory Farmer, her assistance of the comment of the change of the comment of the change of the chang ant, and Eugene Brown, director of public assistance for the State Board of Public Welfare.

The property lien law, passed by the General Assembly, provides for a general lien upon the real property and a claim against the estate of any person who is receiving old age assistance on October 1, 1951. This means that upon the death of any person who receives old age assistance for October or thereafter. a claim will be filed old age assistance for October or thereafter, a claim will be filed against the person's estate to collect from that estate the total amount of assistance paid. All sums collected shall be prorated and all sums collected shall be deposited in the county old age assistance fund.

The 1951 amendments to the public assistance laws authorize the state board to administer the appropriation of \$112,500 to provide for payment for the hospitalization of recipients of old age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the permanently or totally blind disabled in such a manner as to obtain the maximum benefit from available Federal
