The aims and purpose of the Build Freedom With Youth contest is to provide for the youth of our communities an opportunity to be included in community activity, and through it learn to understand and to preserve American Freedom.

The rules of the contest specify that projects are not necessarily for youth but must be with youth for the community. Youth in this particular instance includes the ages of 12-21.

Of the many suggested projects the Edenton Woman's Club has selected as its goal a recreation center for teen-agers since it was felt that a supervised project of this type is vitally needed in this community, and also would fulfill the requirements of the

Although the idea originated with the Woman's Club as a result of the Build Freedom With Youth contest, it should be regarded as a community project inasmuch as other civic organizations have responded enthusiastically to pleas for their cooperation and representatives from various civic groups, as well as from the teen-age group, have been appointed to serve on the Board of Directors which will formulate plans and act as a "guid-ing hand" behind the project.
