Tax Supervisor Urges Early Listing on Part Of Taxpayers

With only a few more days left in 952, County Tax Supervisor Mrs. P. S. McMullan calls attention to the listing of property for taxation which, according to law, must be done during the month of January.

In connection with the listing farm owners or tenants are required to furnish facts about farms which is for information only and is not used for tax purposes. For instance, the tax lister must be informed the acreage for each crop harvested during the calendar year 1952. The number of cows, sows and hens on a farm January, 1953, must be reported, as well as the number of people living on the farm on January 1, 1953.
