### NANCY CARTER TESTED RECIPES

#### APRIL FOOL CAKE

1 envelope unflavored gelatin 1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup CS evaporated milk 1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup cold water 1 Pick of the Nest egg  
1 package semi-sweet chocolate pieces

Soften gelatin in milk and water in top of double boiler. Add 2/3 of chocolate, salt, and 2 tablespoons sugar. Cook over hot water. Stir until chocolate melts and gelatin dissolves. Beat until smooth. Beat egg yolks slightly. Add hot mixture, stir well. Return to double boiler cook 2 min. more. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat egg whites stiff, add rest of sugar. Beat 2 minutes; add vanilla. Fold in chocolate mixture. Pour into hot pan. Chill 15 minutes. Top and sides with whipped cream. Garnish with rest of chocolate. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
