(Continued From Page One) structure uncertain. The house was enlarged and panelling and a new stairway added, presumably by Robert Booth, from whom it takes its name. In 1942 it was moved about half a mile from its original site, and a curved wing was added by the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Leland Plant.

The Paxton House—W. King St. Open 11 A. M. to 1 P. M., and 2 to 5 P. M.

Built in the late 1790's by Samuel Butler, this house takes its name from the family who owned it from 1851 to 1925. In recent years the stairway was moved from the side to the center of the house, and the hall divided into two rooms. Realizing the relation of this house to the slightly later New Bern houses, the present owners have added an appropriate porch and are restoring the interior to its original state. Present owners, Dr. and Mrs. Frank Wood.

Beverly Hall—W. King St. Open Friday only, 10 to 12 M., 2 to 5 P. M. Built in 1810, this house was one of the three original branches of the first State Bank of North Carolina. The great vault remains in the house. Present owner, Mrs. Richard D. Dixon. Albania—W. Queen St. Open 10 to 12 M., 2 to 5 P. M.

Date of construction unknown. The

closed ends of the front galleries resemble those of the low-country houses of South Carolina. This house once belonged to Dr. Edward Warren, Surgeon-General of North Carolina during the Confederacy, who usually added to his name the title Bey conferred upon him by the Khedive of Egypt. The house was recently enlarged by the present owner, Mrs. M. G. Brown. Pembroke Hall—W. King St. Open

2 to 5 P. M. Built about 1840 by Josiah Collins of Somerset, Tyrrell County, for his daughter, Mrs. Matthew Page, this house a fine example of Greek Revival architecture, now belongs to a descendant, who has recently restored it. Present owners, Col. and Mrs. W. B. Roseyear.

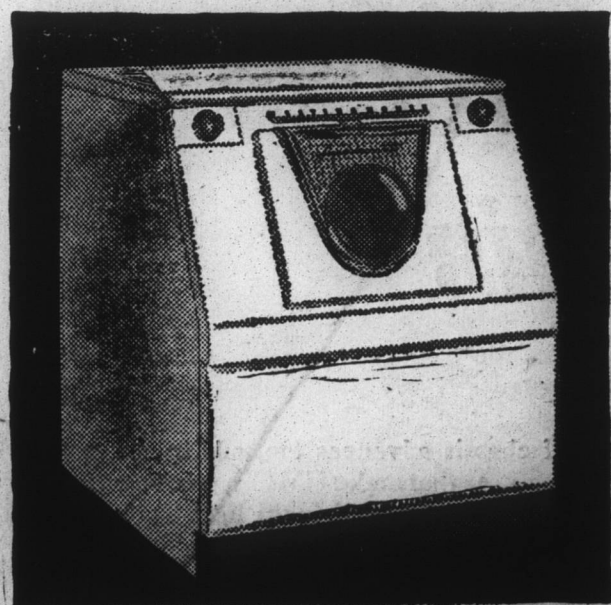

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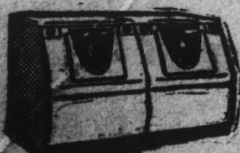
