Wildlife Border Strips Becoming Popular On Farms
R. C. Jordan Willing to Assist Farmers In Planting

E. J. Lane, a farmer of the Chappell Hill neighborhood of Chowan County, has recently completed the establishment of a wildlife border strip along the wood's edge of one of his fields. His son, Durwood Lane, assisted him with the planting operation.

The wildlife border was established by setting four rows, three feet apart, to bicolor lespedeza seedlings. The bicolor seedlings were furnished by the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission in cooperation with the Albemarle Soil Conservation District.

Distribution of the seedlings were made by technicians of the Soil Conservation Service working with the district.

According to Verne E. Davidson, Biologist of the Soil Conservation Service, bicolor is a preferred food of quail. They eat the seeds in preference to their usual favorites—annual lespedeza, cowpeas, soybeans, and partridge peas, he says. The bobwhites begin feeding on bicolor in the early fall, before the hunting season. They will feed every evening and at other times during the day. It has been found, continues Mr. Davidson, that the birds will use this food until they change to insects and

fresh fruits of early summer. Doves and pheasants will use bicolor, but few other birds will. This is fortunate for game conservation, as it leaves the seed for the bobwhites. The bicolor flowers are attractive to honey bees.

According to R. C. Jordan, farm planning technician of the Chowan Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service, shrub lespedezas have been used by S.C.S. for wildlife and erosion control for more than a decade. Of all the species yet to be tried, the bicolor species has been most successful.

Mr. Jordan states that he will as-

sist any farmer who wishes to grow bicolor as a boost to the birds on his farm. It can be planned in a soil and water conservation farm plan and put on the land the next planting season, as was done in the case of Mr. Lane, he added.

Other farmers who have been assisted by the S.C.S. technicians to establish similar wildlife borders on their farms recently were John Parrish, J. D. Copeland, Randolph Ward, Beecher P. Chappell, West and Clarence Leary and R. P. Morris.
