The letters used in the marking system of the Edenton High School are: "A", "B", "C", and "D". "A" Pupil: Is careful and thorough in preparation of all required work. Has excellent self-control and effective study habits. "B" Pupil: Prepares all assignments carefully. Is a good student, but does not show much initiative. "C" Pupil: Does good work most of the time, but requires considerable direction and stimulation from the teacher. Needs to develop more independent habits of study. "D" Pupil: Fails to accomplish the fundamental minimum essentials, necessary for continued progress. Study habits are poor or ineffective. There is one point that is quite important in helping to bring about the whole development of the students, and that is regular attendance. 
