## F & G Treasury Bonds May Be Changed For New 3 1/4% Bonds

### Local Bank Will Advise Holders on Making Exchange

A. Boyd Harless, volunteer chairman of the Chowan County U. S. Savings Bonds Committee reminds all holders of F & G Treasury bonds which will mature between May 1 and December, 1953, of the Treasury offer which makes it possible for them to exchange their bonds for the new Treasury 3 1/4 per cent fully marketable bonds if they desire. The offer announced by Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey, April 13, does not apply to Series E Savings Bonds which mature during the same period. Holders of maturing E Bonds are still privileged to hold the same Bonds for an additional ten years with interest. Holders of maturing F and G Bonds must make application to exchange their bonds for the new 3 1/4 per cent issue before May 1. Arrangements to make the exchange should be made at Federal Reserve Banks and Branches. Local banks will be glad to advise holders on making the exchange, Mr. Harless added.

Exchanges of Series F and G bonds will be made par for par and will be allotted in full. Since holders of Series F and G bonds will receive interest on the new bonds at the rate of 3 1/4 per cent from May 1, 1953, interest adjustments will be made as follows: In the case of Series F bonds the subscriber will be charged an amount equivalent to interest from May 1 to date of maturity of the F bond at the rate of 2.53 per cent annum. In the case of Series G bonds, the owner will receive an interest payment at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent per annum borne by the G bond, from the last interest payment date to May 1, 1953.

The lowest denomination of the new bonds will be \$500, Mr. Harless pointed out. Holders of smaller denomination Series F and G bonds may exchange them for the next higher multiple of \$500 upon payment of any cash difference.

Eligible F and G bond holders who do not wish to make the exchange will have the opportunity of reinvesting the proceeds of their bonds as they mature in Savings Bonds currently on sale, or to receive cash payment.

The Treasury has called the special attention of all F and G bond holders including those corporations and organizations which require directors' or finance committee action, to the limited time available for making application for exchange. The offer expires April 30.

### PROFITABLE FIELD DAY

An excellent field day was held at the Tidewater Experiment Station near Plymouth Wednesday of last week. Marvin Jackson was the only white farmer from Chowan County to attend. Mr. Jackson said that it was

a real treat and the farmers missed a lot by not attending. Some of the features observed were: Controlling curly dock in ladino grass pastures with 2-4-D, hay making equipment, irrigating, various pasture mixtures, fertilizer variation in pastures, and silage making.

## Petitions Asks Repairs For Road In Chowan

Chowan County Commissioners at their meeting Monday morning received another petition for road upkeep. The road in question leads from Mavaton by way of Turkey Neck Farm and from Green Hall school site out to Walter Miller's store on Route 32. The petition, which was signed by 28 persons, stated that the road at times is in such bad shape that school buses must be pulled out of the ditches every week or so and that one bus must travel two miles before it can find a safe place to turn around. It is requested that the road be widened, graded and gravel placed on soft places before next winter.

The Commissioners approved the request, which will be sent to the State Highway and Public Works Commission.

### Vets' Question Box

Q—My wife and I are both World War II veterans. Is it possible for us to combine our GI loan benefits to buy a house?

A—Yes. However, the total amount that VA will guarantee is 60 per cent of the loan. Also, the maximum guaranty may not exceed \$15,000—which represents the combined maximum guarantees you and your wife should be entitled to, individually.

Q—I want to buy a house with a GI loan. Can you tell me why it's necessary to have the house appraised by VA?

A—The law requires that the purchase price of your house must not be more than the reasonable value, as determined by proper appraisal made by an appraiser designated by VA.
