Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest On Program Thursday, June 11

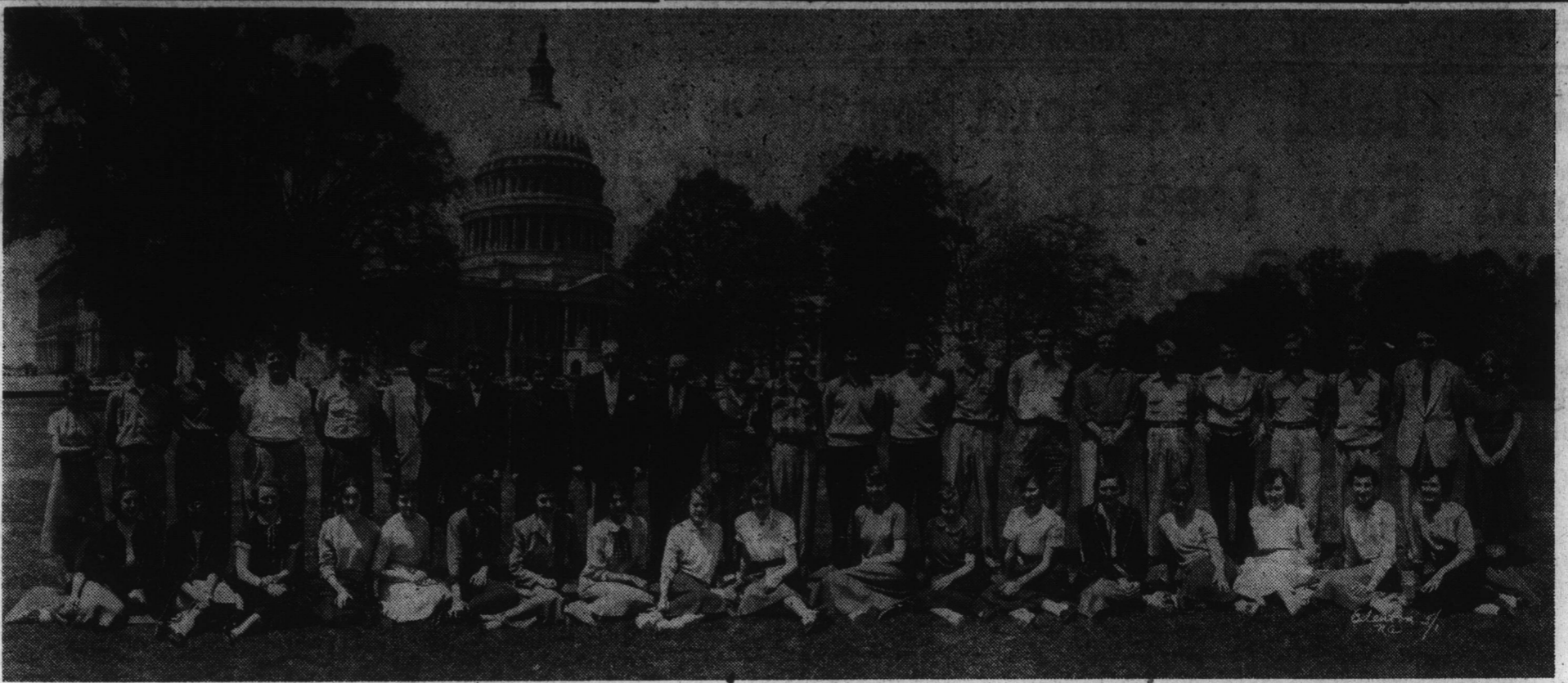
Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest, Treasurer of the United States, will be guest speaker at the annual meeting of the North Carolina Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs on June 11 at Farm and Home Week in Raleigh.

Mrs. Priest was born in Kimberly, Utah, and is the daughter of Orange Decatur and Clara Fearnley Baker. She attended the elementary schools at Kimberly, and was graduated from Bingham High School at Bingham, Utah. She entered the University of Utah, but left college in her freshman year and as the eldest of seven children, took over the family responsibilities when her father, a miner, became ill.

Later Mrs. Priest continued her education through Extension courses at the University of Utah. She became a telephone operator and was soon advanced to supervisor. She then went into merchandising, working during the day and teaching classes in American history and citizenship at night.

Her interest in public service has been reflected in her work as president of the Utah State Women's Legislative Council, as vice-president of the Utah Safety Council and in the general Federation of Women's Clubs and the American Red Cross. She took the lead in winning the first minimum wage for working women in Utah, and participated in the founding of the Youth Center for David County, Utah (Salt Lake City).

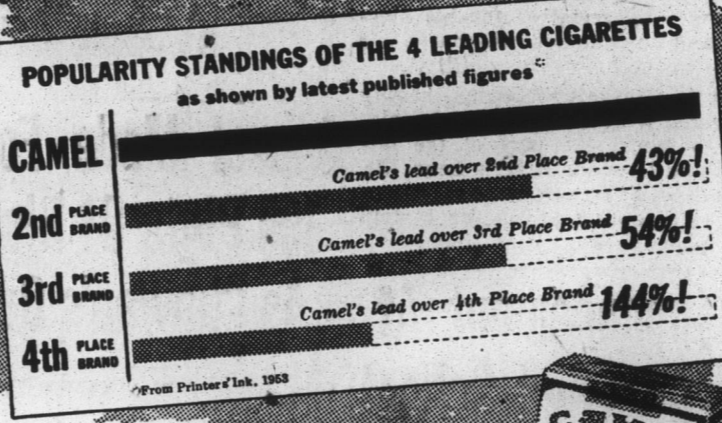

Mrs. Gordon Speaker For St. Paul's Auxiliary

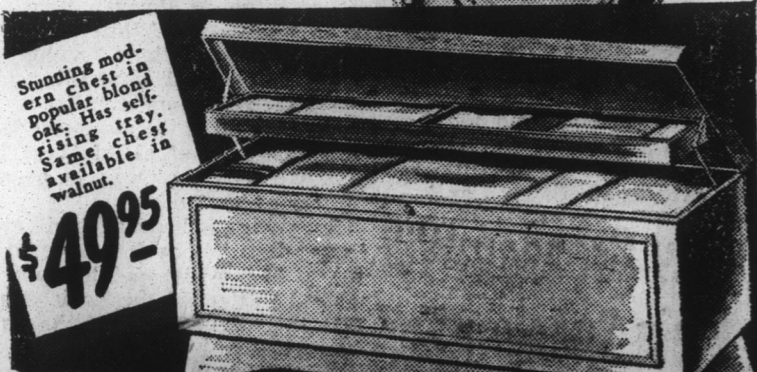
