Must Be Immunized

By Superintendent W. J. Taylor

W. J. Taylor, superintendent of Chowan County Schools, calls attention to the fact that parents whose children enter school for the first time are required by State law to have immunization for diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough, and it is recommended that they have immunization for typhoid and tetanus.

Children who enter for the first time 1953-54, must present a certificate of immunization, either from their family physician or the County Health Department, for diphtheria, smallpox and whooping cough. The County Health Department is open every Friday for immunization.

The State Board of Education has ruled that children may enroll in the 1953-54 term if they are six years of age on or before October 15. If a child is born on October 16, he becomes six on October 15, according to a ruling of the Attorney General.






