

Purebred Swine Sale August 28

25 Head Will Be Sold at Hertford Livestock Market

There will be a Purebred Swine Sale at the Hertford Livestock Market on Friday, August 28, at 1 P. M., according to Radolph Ward, secretary-treasurer of the Albemarle Purebred Swine Breeders' Association. There will be 25 head of Duroc, Hampshires, Spotted and Black Poland Chinas at this auction sale.

This will be the second sale held by the Association this year, and it will give Albemarle farmers a good opportunity to buy some good registered hogs, either open or bred gilts or boars.

Catalogs have already been distributed, and if a person wishes to buy a hog listed, but cannot attend the sale, then he should send in his bid and check to Radolph Ward, Rylant, N. C. In case the bid is not high enough, of course, the check will be returned. All bids will be held in confidence. Terms of the sale are cash.

The Old Cannon Of Edenton

Shipard (nine twenty-four pounders and thirteen eighteen pounders) and took his vessel, the Holy Heart of Jesus, up Mattacomack, near where the U. S. Government fish hatchery is now located and scuttled his boat. (At very low tides the skeleton of this vessel and others can be seen even now.) He settled in Edenton, bought property and reared a family, according to colonial records.

The history of these old cannon has been varied since the day in 1778 when Captain Boritz threw them over the rail.

Two of them now guard the entrance of the State Capitol pointing up Fayetteville Street in Raleigh. Three of them are mounted on granite at the foot of the Court House Green, pointing out over Edenton Bay. One of them is mounted on concrete in a small park on Broad Street near the county dock. One of them is used for a "lean on" post at the corner of Broad and King Streets on the most prominent corner in Edenton near the Bank of Edenton. This cannon has been the silent witness of many conversations and there has been many business deals consummated while two prominent citizens were draped over it at various times. Another one is partly buried on the corner of Queen and Granville Streets. This accounts for eight of the guns, two in Raleigh and six in Edenton. The remainder of the twenty-three, the writer suspects, are sunken low in the mud near the old Joseph Hewes Shipyard and would require mining operations to reclaim them.

It is very improbable that any of these cannon were ever used in battle, as there is no record where any of them were carried from Edenton. But two of them served as a bluff during

the Civil War. They were mounted on the Green overlooking Edenton Bay by the Confederates. When the Federal gunboats appeared off Edenton Bay, the officers observed these guns through their glasses and waited awhile for them to start shooting. As they did not shoot, the Yankees became curious and came ashore. When the officer saw these old relics, he ordered his men to break the trunnions off the guns, saying that there was more danger in the things for the ones who fired them from behind than would be to anyone in front.

The information from which this article is written was gathered from colonial records and from personal accounts by Doctor Richard Dillard, of Edenton.

RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF EDENTON

WHEREAS, on the 7th day of August, 1953, the property owners on that portion of East Church Street lying between Court Street and N. S. Railroad filed with town clerk a petition for improving said street in the following manner: A sidewalk four feet in width on the North side of East Church Street from the Southeast corner of the Maude Brunson lot to the railroad tracks of the Norfolk-Southern Railway Company, be paved with a substantial hard surface pavement and,

WHEREAS, the town clerk has certified to this board that said petition is sufficient in all respects, the same having been duly signed by a majority in number of the owners, who also represent a majority of all the lineal feet of frontage of the lands abutting upon the street or portion of a street above described:

No, Therefore, be it resolved by the Town Council of the Town of Edenton.

1. That the above mentioned petition is found to be sufficient in all respects.

2. That that part of East Church Street lying between Court Street and N. S. Railroad be improved in following manner: A sidewalk in the area described above under and by virtue of Section 160-78 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, 1943, as amended and the procedure thereunder.

3. That fifty per cent of the total cost of said improvement be hereafter assessed upon the lots abutting directly upon the street or portion of the street described herein, exclusive of so much of the total cost as is included in improving the street' inter-sections, according to the extent of their respective frontages by an equal rate per foot of such frontage.

4. That the assessment herein provided for shall be payable in cash or if the property owner should so elect and give notice of the fact in writing to the town clerk in accordance with the provisions of Section 160-92 of the General Statutes, 1943, as amended, he shall have the option and privilege of paying the assessment in 5 equal annual installments. Said installments to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum.

5. That this resolution shall be published in the Chowan Herald on the 20th day of August, 1953.
