operative, but that there was an uncertainty if similar relations will continue to exist in future years so far as the Hicks Field property is con-

cerned, so that they thought the title puzzle should be clarified.  
As it now stands Town Council has some reason to claim title and the School Trustees are of the opinion they hold legal title. Some years ago the Attorney General gave an opinion that the School Trustees held legal title.  
After a lengthy discussion, Town Council hesitated to relinquish title, if it legally holds title, to the entire area.  
A resolution was subsequently adopted to the effect that it was the sense of Town Council to relinquish title to all of the Hicks Field property to the School Trustees except the armory, baseball park and that portion of land on which is the venerable and Spedic Peanut Products are now located. Mayor Haskett appoint-

ed J. Edwin Bufflap, George Alma Byrum and Graham Byrum as a committee to determine the boundaries of these portions of the plot.  
No action as to title can be taken until the next session of the General Assembly, so that in the meantime details will be worked out in compliance with the resolution, so that a local bill can be introduced specifying title to the plot.  
At Tuesday night's meeting an ordinance was adopted to prohibit parking on the east side of Oakum Street in front of the colored school.

### STUFFED TOMATO SALAD

6 medium sized chilled tomatoes  
1/2-cup chopped celery  
1/2-cup chopped cucumber  
1 tablespoon minced onion
