According to Renzo Dee Bowers, a lawer with an interest in sportsmen's problems, the over-all rules prescribing or limiting your rights are these: The exclusive privilege of fishing in non-navigable, or private streams and lakes, belongs to the owners of the land on both sides, and others cannot fish there without the consent of these owners; but anybody is entitled to fish navigable, or public waters if upon or across lands of others who do not permit his doing so. In other words, the right to fish by those who own lands on navigable or public waters or lakes or streams is not ex-

Vote "Yes" October 3 Public Schools Mental Hospitals When the public schools in North Carolina opened their doors for the 1953-54 term, parents, teachers and pupils faced a new emergency. The State is tragically short in space and in facilities for educating her children of today.

In spite of all that has been done in recent years for the mental hospitals of the State, North Carolina is today still sadly deficient in facilities to care for its mentally ill. Today there is a back log of 920 people for care and protection.

ELECTION FACTS

Recognizing the need for better facilities for public education and care for the mentally ill in North Carolina, the General Assembly has authorized an election to be held on October 3 to pass on the issuance of 50 million dollars in bonds for public school improvement and 22 million for mental hospitals improvement.
