

Paper Bullets Help Armies Whip Foes, U. S. Officers Told

WASHINGTON—A select group of Army officers here is learning to wage war without bloodshed.

At Georgetown University, they are mastering the techniques of warfare with words—psychological warfare.

In event of all-out war, responsibility for weakening the enemy's will to resist will be theirs. They, and others similarly trained, will plan psychological attacks on various groups represented in the enemy country—combat troops, factory workers, farmers and others.

Their programs will include techniques for radio broadcasts, printed leaflets and the spoken word—all aimed at persuading the enemy to stop resistance.

These college-trained officers range in rank from first lieutenant to colonel. Most have combat records either from World War II or Korea. Many also have had civilian experience as newspaper and radio script writers, advertising copy writers, promotion and motion picture men or in similar fields. Some are experts in international relations. Others are lawyers.

Now, in their post graduate course in the art of persuasion, they are studying the organizational and operational system of the country which is most likely to be America's future enemy—Russia.

The course embraces influences which impel Communists to think and act in an antagonistic way, analysis of Soviet methods of domination, national characteristics and cultures of Russians and the peoples of the satellite countries and many other related subjects.

Officers now taking the course will complete their studies in January. That same month, another group of aspiring Army psychological warfare officers will begin the course.

With two semester-length courses a year, the Army trains about 50 officers annually for the all important job of helping the United States win wars by crushing the spirit of resistance of the enemy.

Never wash your hands with water after peeling onions. Simply rub them with coarse salt and the odor will disappear. A drop or two of vinegar is good too. It's good, also, as a mouth wash after eating onions. Try using it on your pans.

To remove discolorations and burns from all cooking utensils, boil tea in them 15 to 20 minutes. Then clean in the usual way and they will improve.

Soak a charred steak pan in salt water—cleaning is made easier.

When milk boils over on the stove, quickly sprinkle salt on the milk. This is an easy clean-up method and air conditioner for the burned odor.

To keep the coffee pot sweet, boil a weak solution of borax or soda in it occasionally.

For cleaning decanters or bottles with small necks, peel and cut a raw potato into small pieces. Put the pieces into the decanter with warm water, shake it vigorously up and down and the bottle will soon be clear. Rice is good, also.

In making uncooked frosting, use a hot liquid for moistening, it will take away that distasteful raw taste which uncooked icing has.

In preparing scalloped dishes, corn flakes used in place of bread or cracker crumbs have a better flavor; are always ready to use, and make a more attractive dish—just crush and use as bread crumbs.

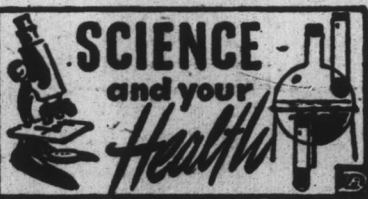
Before grinding sticky fruits, such as figs, raisins or dates through the food chopper, put a few drops of lemon juice in the chopper, and the fruit will not stick to the chopper.

A saucer of ice placed on top of a pitcher or other container full of hot liquid will cool it in a short time, since hot air rises and cold air falls.

Fish steaks, dredged lightly with flour, dipped in milk, then in cornmeal or cracker crumbs and fried in deep, hot fat are much improved in flavor, and the flour helps the meal to adhere better.

Wind helps chenille spreads dry "fluffy as new", especially if you hang them inside out so the tufts rub against each other. Or, just before spreads dry, brush with a stiff brush.

THE SCOURGE OF ARMIES by Science Features

Dysentery has been the scourge of fighting men in every war in history. The disease can strike in epidemic proportions, especially where many men share the same living facilities—as in an army, aboard a ship, or in a prison camp. It is particularly prevalent in Korea.

Even in countries where rigid public health standards are enforced, this disease can be a problem. Some health authorities estimate that 5 to 10 per cent of all Americans are infected with the dysentery germs, although all may not show the symptoms.

Dysentery is a term given to disorders in which there is inflammation of the bowels with diarrhea. Bacillary dysentery, as the name implies, is caused by bacteria, while a parasite called an ameba causes amebic dysentery.

United Nations doctors in Korea have had a unique opportunity to study thousands of cases of both types of dysentery in prisoner of war camps, and to report their evaluation of the latest treatments. Two of their studies covered 1,408 cases of acute bacillary and 538 cases of acute amebic dysentery.

In the first series four antibiotics were used, with best results reported with terramycin. All of the patients treated with it were pronounced cured seven days after treatment began. Against amebic dysentery both antibiotics and other drugs were used. Again, terramycin "proved to be the most effective of the antibiotics."

Knowledge gained by these tests with PW's helps doctors in the selection and application of the most effective treatment to cases of both types of dysentery.

only to protect shades from wear and tear in the shop.

A cloth moistened with vinegar will whiten piano keys.

To prevent mattresses from picking up rust marks from the springs, give the springs a coat of paint when the original paint shows signs of wearing thin.

When repairing furniture requiring a slender nail, try gripping the nail in a spring paper clip until it is well started.

Dust hangs downward, so when you clean walls brush in an upward motion to prevent smearing and streaking.

Keep parchment shades clean by waxing them; it will make them easy to dust and add a soft luster to the finish.

Wall plaster will not crack so easily if a small piece of adhesive or cellophane tape is pasted over the spot

where a tack or nail is to be driven. Immediately after polishing a brass or metal door knocker, wax it to keep it looking bright longer.

To remove white rings left by hot dishes, place a few drops of camphorated oil or sweet oil on the ring, let soak in a few minutes, then polish with a soft cloth.

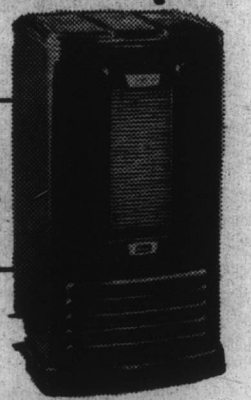

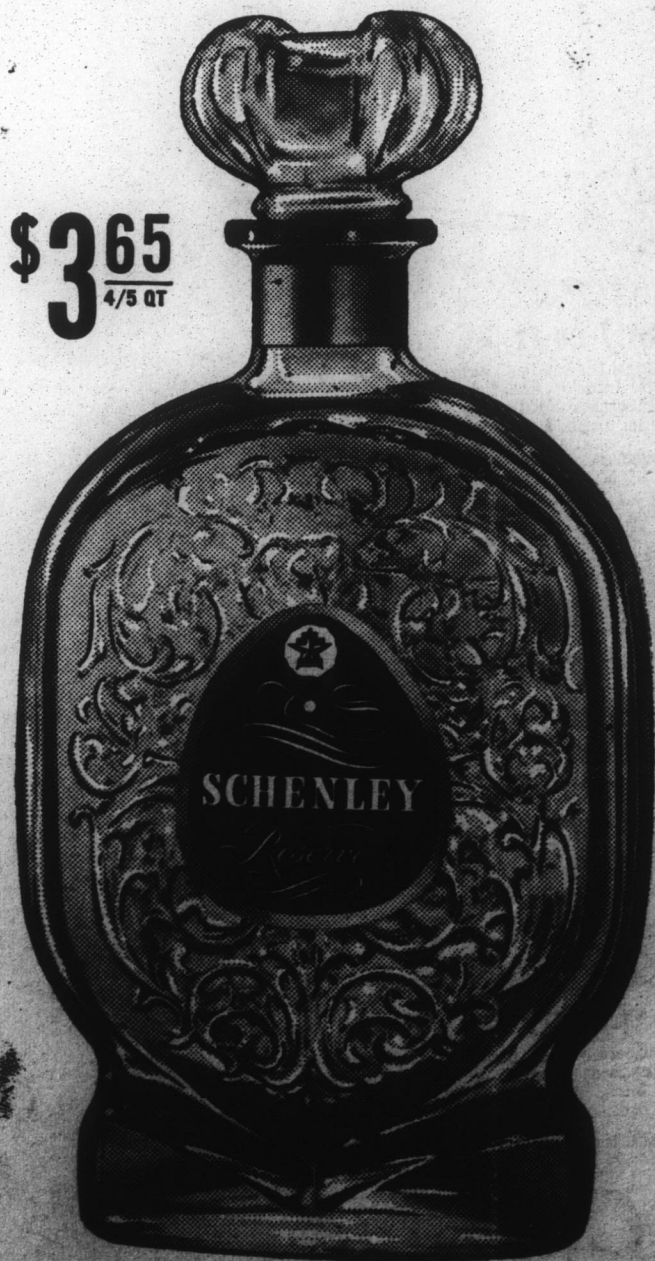

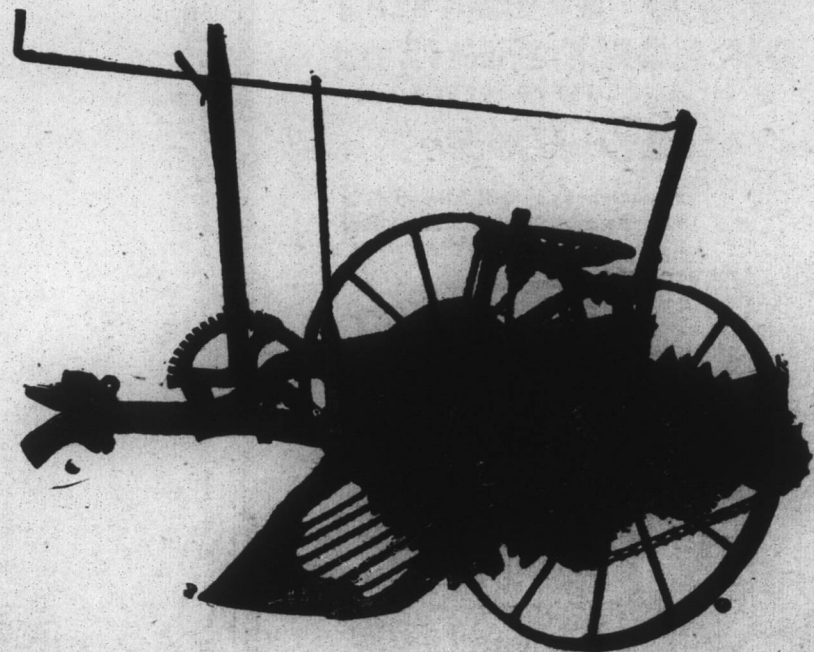
