

## Chowan Freshmen Defeat Aces 19 To 0

### Locals Make Poor Showing Against Collegians Friday

Edenton's Aces, playing under par, were defeated by Chowan College Freshmen on Hicks Field Friday night by a score of 19-0. The game was the most unspportsmanlike seen here in many years, with five players, four visitors and an Edenton player being put out of the game.

While the Aces led in first downs 11 to 7, the outcome of the game was apparent after the visitors scored their first touchdown at the start of the second quarter.

Edenton kicked to start the game but the freshmen were forced to kick, and Whitson returning the ball from his own 20 to the 47. He, together with Stilley made a first down. The Aces were forced to kick and the ball see-sawed back and forth until late in the period when Chowan recovered the ball after a kick on the Edenton 40. The ball advanced to inches of the touchdown stripe as the quarter ended.

On the first play of the second quarter Dickens crashed over for a touchdown. In this quarter the Aces played their best game, chalking up five of their first downs, but a fumble and inability to get passes to click resulted in no scoring.

Chowan scored a touchdown in each of the third and fourth quarters as the Aces gradually weakened in both offensive and defensive departments. The third quarter touchdown was made by Ivey when he romped around right end and although he was trapped on the 35, he evaded the Aces and went all the way. The third score came in the fourth quarter after Edenton fumbled on the 25, and Williams tore through the middle of the line for a touchdown.

Whitson and Stilley were the principal ground gainers.
