

Orphanages Making Annual Appeal For Thanksgiving Funds

Depend Heavily on Season's Offering For Year's Budget

The Thanksgiving season is the most important time of the year for many of the state's 32 orphanages which have cared for nearly 4,500 dependent children this year at a cost of approximately \$3,000,000.

Their supporting constituencies—lodges, fraternal order, religious groups and other non-profit organizations—usually respond generously to these Thanksgiving campaigns and superintendents of the homes are optimistic about this year's offerings.

The appeal to the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina is typical of the other 31 institutions. "Give One Day's Pay" is the theme and this idea has been used by many homes in this and other states. It was originated more than 30 years ago by the late Dr. M. L. Kesler, general superintendent of the Baptist Orphanage from 1905 to 1932 and recognized as one of the state's pioneers in the child care field. Like other homes, the Baptist Orphanage depends heavily on the Thanksgiving offering in the churches since more than one-third of the year's budget comes in during the season.

Fund-raising methods by orphanages have changed considerably in the last two or three decades. The "singing classes" of yesteryear are almost a thing of the past. They were hard on the children and child welfare authorities frowned on them today as being tinged with exploitation of the child. Children now go out in small groups to enjoy the hospitality of churches and other groups when they are invited. Child-caring homes have found that their supporters will see that the children are properly cared for if the needs are made known.

8. Blessed is she who preserves the sanctity of a Christian home; for hers is a sacred trust that crowns her with dignity.

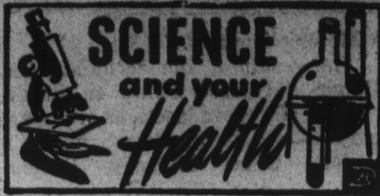

OUTLAW CELLS by Science Features

In the nine months before a child is born it grows from a single cell to a fully-formed human whose body consists of some 200 billion cells. This growth by cell division continues until maturity, when natural "brakes" are applied and the cells stop dividing except to keep the body in good repair.

Sometimes, however, certain cells become "outlaws" and continue to divide, growing into clumps that harm the body. The result is cancer. How it develops, why it develops, and how it can be treated constitute one of the most challenging fields of medical research.

The traditional treatment for cancer consisted either of surgical removal of the tumor or its bombardment with X-rays or atomic radiation, but scientists attending a meeting in New Orleans recently heard a report that female breast cancer can be treated with a type of male hormone called Neodrol.

According to the report, 42 cases of breast cancer were treated with the hormone with relief of symptoms noted in 87 per cent of the patients. These results lend new support to the theory that the malignancy of cancer cells may depend to some degree on the action of hormones secreted by endocrine glands.
