The highlight of the meeting was the announcement of the four seal sale chairman of the district and the quota for the 1953 Christmas drive, which follows:

Chowan County—John A. Mitchener, Jr., Chairman. Quota, \$2,400.

Pasquotank County—Cader Harris, Jr., Chairman. Quota, \$5,000.

Camden County—George Wood of Camden, Chairman. Quota, \$1,025.

Perquimans County—J. W. Ward, Chairman. Quota, \$1,950.

Chowan County has four patients in the sanatorium and ten are on the waiting list. There were 2,326 new

cases in North Carolina in 1952. Christmas Seals are the sole support of the Tuberculosis Association and in 1954 it is planned to hold a mass X-ray with 33,000 persons in the district who should be X-rayed. Over 10,000 letters will be mailed out, with 1,800 of them in Chowan County, with Mrs. Aubrey C. Turbeville in charge.

Chairman John Mitchener states that 96 per cent of the money raised from the sale of Christmas seals remains in the State. He points out that tuberculosis is the No. 1 health problem because it is contagious, preventable and curable and for that reason he urges a generous response in behalf of purchasing and using Christmas Seals.
