## Milk Ordinance And Code is Adopted By Loca Health Board

Adequate Supply of Pasteurized Milk Available In District

The District Board of Health in its recent meeting was asked to adopt the 1953 "Milk Ordinance and Code" as recommended by the United States Public Health Service. This is the same ordinance recommended for counties and health districts throughout the State. The Pasquotank, Camden-Chowan Health District now op-erates under the 1939 edition of this

The existing regulations are now considerably out of date because of the many developments in milk technology and sanitation since the adoption of the present regulations. Accordingly, all local health departments are urged to bring their milk sanitation regulations up to date. The 1953 regulations are recommended for the adoption of the same regulations by all local boards of health will avoid conflicts and misunderstandings. These regulations are in no way designed to work a hardship on producer, plant or distributor. These changes have been thoroughly discussed in district meetings held by milk specialists from the State Board of Health with local sanitarians.

Apparently the most important question is: What grade of milk shall be offered for sale in the health district? Whether it be pasteurized products only, or whether raw milk also shall be permitted to be offered for sale. The State Board of Health has recommended for many years the use of pasteurized milk. A large percent-age of market milk sold in North Carolina is now pasteurized. "We are of the opinion there is an adequate supply of pasteurized milk available throughout this health district," says Dr. B. B. McGuire, health officer.
