V. Cross, Jr., \$130; Perquimans County, Archie Lane, \$48; and Hertford, Chairman John iBggers, \$300.

Mr. Orr stated that he hoped campaigners would turn in all contributions at once so that the campaign may be officially closed.

All funds are being deposited in an Elizabeth City bank for 1954 operating expenses.

Soil Conservation Supervisor Election Scheduled Dec. 7-12

Woodrow Lowe, Augustus Spruill and L. C. Bunch Candidates

The annual Soil Conservation Supervisors election will be held during the week of December 7 to 12, 1953. The election in Chowan County will be held for the purpose of selecting a member of the Chowan Committee of Soil Conservation Supervisors. L. C. Bunch, chairman of the Chowan Committee, announces that ballot boxes will remain at the various polling places during the entire week. Every legally qualified voter is urged to visit the polling place in his community and cast his ballot for the candidate of his choice.

Woodrow Lowe, Augustus Spruill, and L. C. Bunch have been nominated as candidates in the election. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes will serve on the Chowan Committee for a period of three years.

The successful candidate will fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of L. C. Bunch's term of office on December 31, 1953.

The Chowan Committee has arranged for ballot boxes to be placed in the following places in the county: Yeopim—Levy Williams store; Edenton—Byrum Hardware Store; Cowpen Neck—Grover Cale's Store; Rocky Hook—Earl Smith's and Henry Bunch's Stores; Small's Cross Roads—Melvin Evans' Store; Center Hill—J. I. Boyce's and Titus Chappell's Stores; Valhalla—Earl Ashley's Store; Ryland—Arthur Byrum's Store; and Gliden—Lloyd Briggs' Store.

According to the Chowan Committee, voters may vote for only one candidate in this election.

The Soil Conservation Supervisors' election is an annual affair. It will be conducted in 1953 in all counties

in the Albemarle Soil Conservation District during the week of December 7 to 12.

HENRY CARTER'S RECIPES

JAPANESE FRUIT CAKE

2/3 cup Triangle Butter
1 1/2 cups sugar
1/2 pint of the best eggs
1 cup sifted cake flour
1/2 cup chopped raisins
1/2 cup chopped peans

1/3 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon each Cinnamon, allspice, cloves, nutmeg
2/3 teaspoon soda
2/3 cup buttermilk

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Use 1/2 cup flour to mix with raisins and nuts. Mix remaining flour, salt, spices, and nuts together. Add to first mixture alternately with buttermilk. Mix in raisins and nuts. Turn into 3 9-inch paper-lined cake pans. Bake in slow oven, 300 degrees, about 1 hour or until cake leaves sides of pan. Fill as FILLING—Combine 2 cans coconut (grated or finely chopped), 2 1/2 cups sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, vanilla and salt and fill of 2 loaves, 1 1/2 cups butter. Mix well, cook until very thick. Cool before using.
