In December 1943, he was advanced to the post of assistant manager of the Production Division, having jurisdiction over Remington's four commercial plants located at Bridgeport, Conn., Ilion, N. Y., Kings Mills, Ohio, and Findlay, Ohio. On March 31, 1945, he became manager of the Production Division and soon was named director of production.
