

## Signals Important In Averting Mishaps

### Campaign to Educate Motorists to Use Signals When Driving

J. T. Outlaw, executive vice president of North Carolina Motor Carriers Association, Inc., Raleigh, says that, although our country's need for new roads is great, many of us are overlooking the fact that our accident rate could be cut considerably if the driving knowledge and technique of the American motorist were improved.

"It will take years to build the highways we need," said Mr. Outlaw, "but while we're waiting we should make every effort to instill safe driving ideas in the mind of every motorist."

Mr. Outlaw's remarks came as part of his trucking NCMCA monthly courtesy and safety campaign. The campaign for February is to educate people in the use of signals in their driving.

"The use of turn signals and stop signals," continued Mr. Outlaw, "is practical on old roads and modern highways alike." "They do much to eliminate traffic jams and collisions by warning other motorists in the immediate vicinity of an action which is about to take place. Every day hundreds of traffic jams are created because inconsiderate motorists fail to signal their intention to turn or stop with the result that following traffic is unable to swing around the vehicle waiting to turn. Every day we read in the papers of four, five, and six car collisions caused by one vehicle stopping abruptly and other vehicles, following too closely, running into the rear of it. A signal of intention to stop when given well in advance could, in most cases, eliminate these collisions."

Mr. Outlaw concluded his statement with the thought that "Courtesy is contagious" and what one driver receives in courtesy is likely to be passed on by him thus making our roads safer and easier to drive on.




