

Negro Club Women Hold Kitchen Tour Families Visited to Witness Improvements Made

Thirty-six home demonstration club women braved the inclement weather on March 3, to make the kitchen improvement tour. The families visited, who cheered early last year to start making needed improvements and other club members could get suggestions that might be used to improve their kitchens. Family kitchens inspected on the tour were:

Mrs. Clara Newby—Triangle Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is yellow and green. She built wall cabinets and base cabinets, put in electric refrigerator and painted kitchen.

Mrs. Katie Granby—St. John Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white with red. She painted and made curtains.

Mrs. Cora Williams—St. John Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is red and white. She had a small kitchen and dining room. Knocked out wall between the two and made a larger kitchen with attractive eating area. Put in large sink, hot water, gas stove, shelves and painted kitchen.

Mrs. Emma J. Bemby—Canaan

Temple Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is cream and red. She built wall cabinet, made base cabinet out of old side board, put in gas cooking stove and painted kitchen.

Mrs. Sue Wilhoite—Edenton Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is yellow and white. She made shelves for storage, built cabinet next to sink for better working space.

Mrs. Clara Carter—Warren Grove Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white with red. She built wall and base cabinets out of two bureau drawers, made attractive eating area in kitchen and painted.

Mrs. Rebecca Beasley—Hudson Grove Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is light green. She made shelves for storage, made dish washing center, made wall cabinet, curtains, table cloth, shelf curtains made from feed bags.

Mrs. Mary Brown—Hudson Grove Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white with red. She purchased wall cabinet, put in electric refrigerator and painted.

Mrs. Bertha Twine—Center Hill Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white with red. She painted, put in electric stove, refrigerator and improved kitchen storage.

Mrs. Cora White—Cisco Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white with green. She put in running water, sink, electric refrigerator, storage shelves and painted.

Mrs. Louvenia Valentine—Green Hall Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white. She made storage shelves, made storage cabinet out of old side board, made shelf curtains

out of figured feed bags to add color to the room.

Mrs. Bessie Holley—White Oak Home Demonstration Club. Her color scheme is white. She improved kitchen storage, painted kitchen and new kitchen curtains.
