

Jury Declares Mrs. Lillie Ward Guilty

 there need not be cause for concern about any irregularities in the county's fiscal affairs.
 The Grand Jury was also instructed to look over the last two reports to see if any recommendations had been ignored. In this respect, Judge Carr said recommendations are only persuasive in character and that when recommendations are made having to do with the expenditure of a substantial amount of public funds, the County Commissioners should be consulted.
 In closing his remarks, Judge Carr referred to the slaughter on public highways, saying that despite the efforts to curtail accidents, wholesale violation of the traffic laws continues.
 Upon reviewing the calendar Judge Carr was not favorably impressed with the continuation of so many cases, especially with a term of court being held at such long intervals.
 The first case disposed of was John Wayland Cullipher, charged with operating an automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor. It was the defendant's second offense and he was sentenced to six months, suspended upon condition that he pay a fine of \$200 and costs of court and showing good behavior for a period of two years. He was also required to surrender his driver's license to the Clerk of Court.
 Next to be disposed of was Kelly Springfield White and Edward Earl Hall, Negroes, the latter only 14 years old. Both plead guilty to forgery. It was brought out that the Hall boy wrote and forged five checks amounting to \$197.25. He was promised \$5.00

for writing the checks by White, who bought various items at several stores and received cash for the remainder of the checks.
 White was sentenced to not less than four years and not more than six years in State Prison, while Judge Carr ordered Probation Officer C. W. Thompson to make an effort to place Hall in a reformatory institution.
 Peter Privott was found not guilty on a charge of failing to stop at a scene of an accident involving personal injury.
 The Grand Jury returned "not a true bill" against Nellie Ross, Clinton Ross and Nora Ross on a charge of breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony therein and larceny.
 Before adjourning for the day James Richardson, charged with first degree murder and accessory before the fact of abortion, through his attorney, John F. White, entered a plea of guilty to accessory before the fact to the wilful and felonious use of an instrument thereby procure the miscarriage of his wife, Joyce Hudson Richardson.
 The trial of Lillie Ward was also started before recessing Monday afternoon. Mrs. Ward is charged with performing an abortion on Mrs. Joyce Hudson Richardson which resulted in her death. A plea of not guilty was entered.
 The trial of Mrs. Ward continued through Tuesday and before court adjourned for the day defense attorneys made their arguments to the jury. Prosecutor Walter Cahoon presented his argument to the jury Wednesday evening, which completed the criminal docket.
 The remainder of the term will be devoted to divorce actions and one civil action, W. J. Daniels vs. Hoyt Hollowell which involves an automobile wreck a few years ago.

1 8 oz. package Triangle Macaroni
 2 tablespoons Triangle butter
 3/4 tablespoons flour
 2 cups milk

2 teaspoons salt
 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
 1/4 cups grated American cheese
 1 cup Raguato tomatoes, drained

Cook macaroni according to package directions. Melt butter in top of double boiler, blend in flour. Add milk gradually. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper. Add cheese, tomatoes and macaroni. Turn into a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Heat in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 15 minutes. Makes 6 servings.
