

New Officers Elected For TB Association

Budget of \$8,180.21 Is Adopted for Year at Annual Meeting

The semi-annual Dutch board meeting of the Pasquotank-Perquimans-Camden-Chowan Tuberculosis Association met Thursday night of last week in the Hotel Hertford at Hertford.

Those attending were W. J. Taylor, Ralph Parrish and Gerald James from Chowan County, Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Morgan, Mr. and Mrs. Archie Lane, Mr. and Mrs. Garland Towe, Mrs. C. P. Morris, Dr. Allan Bonner and Mrs. Russell Baker from Perquimans County, Phillip Meekins of Camden, R. L. Garrett, J. H. Moore, A. H. Outlaw, George Halstead, Mrs. David Fearing, Mrs. Martin Simpson, Mrs. Evelyn Hackell, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Davenport, Miss Addie Darden, field secretary from the N. C. Tuberculosis Association and Mrs. Duke Cropsey from Pasquotank County.

The invocation was given by W. J. Taylor of Edenton.

After a delicious dinner, served by Mrs. Bagley, the meeting was called to order by R. L. Garrett, president. Dr. Allan Bonner, treasurer, reported the bank balance as of March 31, 1954, totaled \$461.41. The 1953 Seal Sale in the district netted \$7,718.80, making a total of \$8,180.21 for the budget for 1954-55.

It was reported that 2,993 chest X-rays were taken in the district during the year.

Ralph Parrish, chairman of the Health Education Committee from Chowan, reported material and posters on tuberculosis in all schools in the district. Several schools had programs in PTA meetings and special pamphlets to parents.

All home demonstration clubs, white and colored, in the district had material for their health leaders and members. Mrs. Velma Joyner, Negro health educator from the N. C. Tuberculosis Association will be in the district May 3 through May 12 for a series of talks to school faculties and home demonstration members.

Mrs. C. P. Morris of Perquimans reported Perquimans Training School entered the school press project with the other counties and received the award for the best entry.

Oratorical contests were held in Perquimans Training and Hertford colored elementary schools with judges from Perquimans County.

Phillip Meekins of Camden reported a school press project in Sawyer's Creek High School and an oratorical contest in the Sawyer's Creek Elementary and Rosenwald.

A TB unit has been formed in the 6th and 7th grades in the Camden schools.

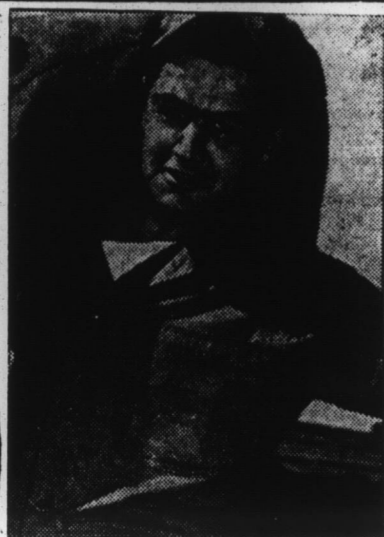
Pasquotank reported P. W. Moore school also entered the press project and PTA programs on TB were presented at Pasquotank Consolidated, Bank Street School and P. W. Moore. An oratorical health contest was held in the Bank Street, Training School, Pasquotank and Consolidated and St. Elizabeth Catholic School. Films were shown in schools and the Negro Bible Training School. Several elementary grades had programs on TB and visits to the Health Department and talks by the public health nurses.

Edward Davenport, chairman of the Rehabilitation Committee from the district, Mrs. J. A. Moore from Chowan, Mrs. B. F. Harrison from Camden and Mrs. Earl Perry from Perquimans reported their committees had been very active, remembering their patients with packages from the window, churches, missionary circles, Bible school and civic clubs remembered the patients at various times during the year at home and in the sanatorium. Seasonal cards were sent to all patients from the district. Magazines were available at all times for patients waiting at home. Red Cross sent favors to patients in the Wilson Sanatorium.

Mrs. Evelyn Hackell, reported that in the district during 1953 there were 34 new cases reported, 13 deaths, 35 in the sanatorium and 19 waiting at home.

Many volumes have been written about the major game fish, but the pan fish (except possibly bluegills and crappies) go unmentioned and unused despite the fact that they furnish the bulk of fishing in the United States.

Pan fish are especially useful if you're learning fly casting or spinning because there are plenty of them around to give you frequent practice.

Hooking and landing one is not greatly different from catching a so-called "game" fish except for size, and some pan fish run a respectable pound or pound and a half.

Few of them have the usual savage strike of a bass, trout or pike. But, according to sportsman-writer Bill Wolf, that only makes them more interesting to catch, and gives the novice caster the delicate touch he needs on the rod.

Most pan fish are caught on bait but that is only because fishermen have never learned the greater pleasure they can get from casting for them. Pan fish are very obliging when it comes to bait since they will taste almost anything. Just be careful not to use too large a bait, and thus get short strikes. For instance, the common angleworm works well but the big night crawlers or dew worms won't.

Bait fishing is simply a matter of experimenting with different depths until you catch fish. Where this is one, there will be others. Fly fishing with a wet fly or streamer is a matter of casting to a rise, or to a likely spot, and then retrieving the lure with a twitching motion, a sort of start-and-stop action. Most pan fish and especially crappies have a curious habit of following a moving lure, stopping when it stops, and hitting only after thinking it over. Move the lure, but give them time to decide, if they do not strike the moment it hits the water.

Descriptions cannot be exact because sunfish crossbreed, and the resulting hybrids can puzzle even an ichthyologist. But the best-known sunfish other than the crappies and bluegills is the common sunfish, otherwise the sunnie, pumpkinseed, kiver, kivy, red perch, sun perch, or yellow-belly, among various aliases. A bright red spot on the gill cover and, usually, light and bright blue stripes on its cheeks are the distinguishing characteristics.
