Production of eggs in North Carolina during April, 1954, amounted to 141 million eggs. This amount is seasonably lower than the 156 million produced during April, 1953.

The monthly average number of layers on North Carolina farms during April was placed at 7,848,000 by the Crop Reporting Service. This number is 6.5 per cent lower than the monthly average of 8,395,000 layers on hand a year earlier.

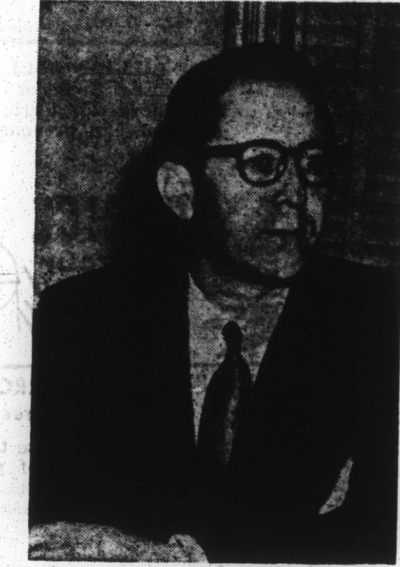
