Don't Pass It Up!

Attention is called to the mass chest X-ray survey which will be conducted in Edenton from June 2 through July 8. The purpose of this survey is to give a free chest X-ray for every person in the county 15 years old and over, and includes all persons in the Pasquotank - Perquimans - Camden-Chowan District Health Department.

It is calculated that 8,260 persons in Chowan County should be X-rayed to detect the presence of tuberculosis. The work will be done by qualified physicians and each person X-rayed will receive notification of the finding.

It is a known fact that in many cases a person has tuberculosischut is not aware of it. By being X-rayed and finding the disease present in the early stages, a shorter period of treatment will be required and obviously the person affecetd will save expense in being treated.

There is so liftle trouble to be X-rayed that every eligible person in the county should have it done. It is not necessary to undress and only a few minutes is required.

With four units in operation in the district, one will be stationed near the Edenton Police Station and will be open every day from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M. except Sundays and Mondays from June 2 through July 8.

The unit will also be at Chowan High School June 22, 23, 24, 25 and 26 from 10 A. M. to 4 P. M., so that it will be more convenient for upcounty citizens.

This survey is made possible by the District Health Department, the Board of Commissioners of all four counties in the district, the District Tuberculosis Association and the N. C. State Board of Health.
