One of the most disastrous fires in Edenton in recent years occurred shortly after 6 o'clock Friday afternoon when the W. E. Malone 5 and 10-cent store was gutted, with the result that the entire stock of merchandise and fixtures were a total loss. The building, which is owned by John Bond, was also badly damaged.

Great quantities of smoke spread into the Elliott Company store, as well as the Hughes-Parker Hardware store, with considerable damage done to the merchandise in the Elliott store. Very little damage, however, was done in the hardware store.

The fire was discovered about 6:15 o'clock by Mrs. Irma Allsbrook, who passed the store and noticed smoke coming from the front ventilators and then saw the store filled with smoke and flames in the rear. Mr. Malone was at home eating supper at the
