

# Hertford's Indians In Lead For Title In Albemarle League

## Win Three of the Four Games Played With Elizabeth City

Due to rain and wet grounds, the seven-game series to decide the championship of the Albemarle League between Hertford and Elizabeth City has been limited to four games up to Wednesday of this week.

Of the four games played, the Hert-

ford Indians have a decided edge, having won three of the contests.

The first game of the series was won by Hertford in Elizabeth City Tuesday night of last week when the Indians won 5 to 4. Jim Curtis, Elizabeth City's moundsman, who hung up 17 straight victories, allowed only six hits, but his downfall was caused by costly errors on the part of his teammates. All of Hertford's runs were unearned, which made Curtis' defeat all the more bitter.

Ted Chappell went the route for Hertford and while being touched for nine hits, he was very effective in the pinches.

Elizabeth City knotted the series Wednesday night when they defeated the Indians in Hertford by a score of 6 to 5. John Copley started on the mound for Elizabeth City and had things pretty much his own way un-

til the seventh and eighth when he developed a streak of wildness. He was saved by Jim Curtis, who went on the mound in the final frame with one man on base and no outs.

Allen and Billy Winslow, pitching for Hertford, were touched for 11 hits.

With Vernon White on the mound, Hertford again went into the lead by winning the third game of the series in Elizabeth City Thursday night by a score of 6 to 2. White allowed only eight hits, three of which were made by Dick Todd.

Victor Zink started for Elizabeth City but gave way to Harold Gregory. The Indians hammered out 13 hits.

The game on Friday night was rained out, but on Saturday night Hertford went ahead in the series 3-1 by defeating Elizabeth City in Elizabeth City by a score of 4 to 3. It was a mound duel between Jim Curtis

for Elizabeth City and Ted Chappell for Hertford.

Chappell had the better of the argument, allowing Elizabeth City only four hits, while the Indians touched Curtis for seven bingles.


