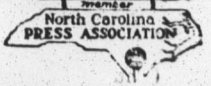

Something Wrong Somewhere

Apparent lack of interest and, of course, a band which falls short of expectations, come in for some discussion at Tuesday night's meeting of Town Council and, unless more interest and progress is shown, the annual appropriation of \$1,700 for the band for the next fiscal year might be eliminated from the town's budget.

Prospects for continuation of the band are rather gloomy according to Director Ernest Gentile, who informed The Herald this week that at the present time he has only about 10 boys and girls to attend regular band practice sessions.

According to Director Gentile, three important members recently dropped out of the band, four take typing when band rehearsals are held, and nine practice with the Glee Club. Besides, one takes mechanical drawing, another is obliged to leave to work in the cotton mill, one is hopeless, another shows no interest in the band and two are not making much progress. In the group also are four beginners and three elementary pupils.

Mr. Gentile says he is very conscientious in his work and would like to turn out a good band for the school, but that with the present lack of interest and conflicting schedules of classes he is about ready to throw in the towel.

The Herald is not acquainted with the situation other than to sense the fact that the band is not as good as it has been, and on Monday night former members were pressed into service in order to make a good showing, which is not as it should be.

The Herald is of the opinion that a good high school band is just or more important not only to the school but the town as a whole, than a good football, baseball or basketball team or glee club. In fact, a football game lacks something and is mighty flat without a band on hand and then, too, more impetus and interest is developed in any community affair, such as the Christmas and Halloween parties and other activities when the services of a band are available.

Whatever the difficulty is, The Herald hopes it will be solved to the end that students as well as citizens of Edenton will again be proud of its band.

Dr. Robert Daniel Fills Pulpit Sunday At Baptist Church

Will Preach at Both Services In Absence of Pastor

Dr. Robert T. Daniel, professor of Old Testament Interpretation at the Southeastern Baptist Seminary in Wake Forest, has accepted the invitation of the pulpit committee to preach at both the morning and evening services of the Baptist Church Sunday, September 19. The morning service is at 11 o'clock and the evening service at 7:30 o'clock. Dr. Daniel, who comes to the Edenton pulpit in the absence of the pastor now on vacation, brings a broad background in the fields of teaching and preaching; his teaching activity having extended into the fields of public school, instruction and theological seminary professorship.

Before coming to the Old Testament professorship at Southeastern, Dr. Daniel was a professor at the Southwestern Theological Seminary and prior to that taught in the public schools of North Carolina. He was born in Tennille, Georgia, and holds the A.B. degree from Mercer University, the M.A. degree from Texas Christian University, the Th.M. and Th.D. degrees from the Southwestern Theological Seminary and has done graduate work at the University of North Carolina.

The regular services of the church will be observed and, other than the morning worship service at 11 o'clock and the evening service at 7:30 o'clock, Training Union will meet Sunday night at 6:15 o'clock. The public is cordially invited to all of the services of the church.

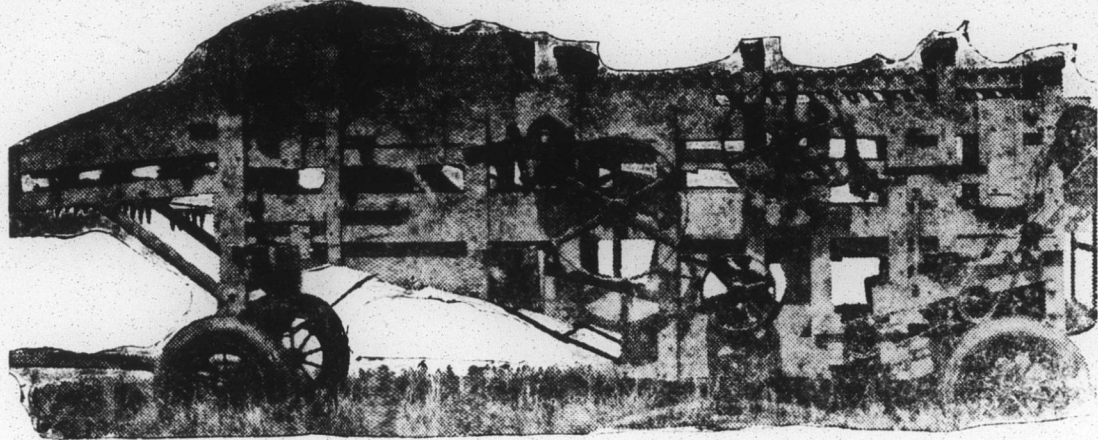

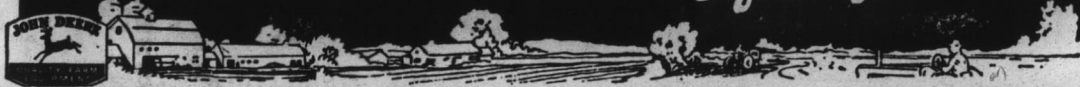
