

## White Oak School Closed Two Weeks

### Action Taken In Order To Help Harvest Cotton Crop

W. J. Taylor, superintendent of schools in the County Administrative Unit, has announced that the White Oak Consolidated School closed Tuesday of this week and will remain closed through Tuesday, September 28. The school will reopen Wednesday morning, September 29.

The closing of the school for two weeks is in accordance with action taken at the beginning of the school term by the County Board of Education in order to make it possible for pupils in the school to help pick the cotton crop.

The Aces were forced to kick with Roanoke Rapids getting the ball on their own 26, but Edenton recovered a fumble on the visitors' 21. Whitson made a neat gain, but the play was nullified and the Aces penalized 15. With first down and 25 to go on the Roanoke Rapids 31, Stillely added three and Harrison lost 1, but Holland then flipped the only Edenton pass of the game to Emminger, who raced to the 3-yard line. On the next play the Aces fumbled, but the visitors could make little headway and kicked out to their own 25, when another fumble cost the Aces the ball. After recovering their own fumble, Jack Smith intercepted Deavers' pass and scooted for the second Edenton touchdown. Whitson raced around right end to score the extra point. On the third play the whistle sounded ending the game.

Quarterback Tay Byrum had the misfortune to break his collarbone late in the game and will probably be out of action for the remainder of the season.

On defense Lyn Bond played an outstanding game, aided by splendid work by Bill Hardison, Cecil Miller and Chan Wilson, while Milton Stillely, John Whitson, Stuart Holland and Jimmy Harrison looked good on offense.

**BANANA NUT BREAD**  
1 1/2 cups sifted all purpose flour  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup chopped nuts  
Sift together flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Add nuts and mix well. Cream shortening. Gradually add sugar. Continue beating until light and fluffy. Add well beaten eggs. Blend well. Add flour alternately with bananas a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Turn into a well greased loaf pan, 9 x 5 x 3 inches. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, 1 hour. Make 1 loaf.
