The first step toward improving the quality of cotton must necessarily be taken by the cotton producers, according to Upchurch.

He said growers must be encouraged to carry out the best harvesting practices. "Carelessly and improperly harvested cotton cannot be ginned with results equal to those obtained with cotton which has been properly harvested," he said.

After cotton arrives at the gin, it is then up to the ginner to examine each lot of seed cotton carefully to deter mine the proper amount of machinery and heat needed to do the best possible ginning job. It is also a major responsibility of the gin operator to keep his yard and buildings clear of tar spots, grease spots, lint fly, loose motes and other foreign matter that could damage the cotton.


