All farm people who are interested in having their cows tested by the North Carolina Veterinarian, Dr. Bradshaw, sometime this month, should contact County Agent C. W. Overman.

"This is a free service of the North Carolina Veterinary Association that should be taken advantage of by all owners of dairy and beef cattle," says Mr. Overman.

"Send a card to the County Agent's office stating how many cows you have to be tested, your name and address not later than Monday, October 18th."
