Nip And Tuck Contest Played In Tarboro Monday Night

fish house was badly damaged, especially the vat rooms and cutting tables, which were washed away. Luther Bunch's fish house was demolished and Will and Palmer Tynch's fish house was blown down.

The Cannon Ferry Fish Company building was demolished and the Harding fish house, too, was washed away. At the Chowan River Fish Company cutting tables, fish washing machinery and other parts of the building were wrecked. Fish houses at Bass and White Landings were badly damaged as was the case on the Bertie County side of Chowan River.

Throughout the county considerable damage was done to houses, barns and outbuildings. A. M. Forehand's farm was especially badly damaged.

Electric and telephone service were knocked out and it required several days for necessary repairs to be made in order to resume normal service.

Street Department employees began the work of digging out of the debris just as soon as it was safe to be outdoors. However, so much damage was done to trees and debris scattered all over town that it will probably be some time next week until all of the work is completed.

Though a great deal of property damage was done the county was very fortunate in that nobody was injured or killed.
