Relief is given irrespective of race, creed, politics or previous conduct. It is an outright gift from the American people through the Red Cross. No loans are made and no repayment can be accepted.

Assistance is given in kind rather than cash. The families helped have the privilege of selecting the merchant with whom they wish to trade. The merchants are given disbursing orders and paid by check, thus keeping trade in its normal channels.

Red Cross does not repair rental property.

and individuals and not for businesses. Relief is extended only when necessary to supplement the actual and potential resources of the family affected. Need and not loss is the basis for disaster relief.

When an application has been made planning with a caseworker will follow to determine what the family can do and what will be needed by the Red Cross to give the family a foothold and enable them to recover.
