

September Sales Of U. S. Saving Bonds In Chowan Total \$7,315

Monthly Report Released By Chairman A. B. Harless

A. B. Harless, U. S. savings bonds chairman for Chowan County, has released the September sales figures of Series E & H Savings Bonds, which totaled \$7,315.50.

During the first three quarters of 1954, Chowan County citizens have saved \$132,047.75 through their purchases of the Series E & H Savings Bonds.

In North Carolina, sales for September, as released by State Director Walter P. Johnson, and State Chairman W. H. Andrews, Jr., were \$3,570,103.00. The total amount of bonds sold in the State from January through September, is \$35,480,948.50, which is an approximate 6 per cent increase over the same period of 1953.

National sales of Savings Bonds continue to exceed redemptions even though the heavy sales of the war years are now maturing. Nationwide sales exceeded redemptions so far this year by \$314 million. This is the largest net gain for such a period since 1949, while total sales for the first nine months of 1954 are the greatest in nine years.

The amount of outstanding E & H Savings Bonds is the greatest in history, with approximately \$38 billion in the hands of individual Americans. People who buy bonds regularly continue to build their own security and to insure the continued prosperity for the nation.

is next largest but has somewhat smaller membership. The speaker pointed out that the Southern region has more farm families than the other three regions combined. The Southern region has a possibility of having a very influential vote in the American Farm Bureau if the farmers will only cooperate with their membership.

Mr. Maddrey pointed out that one of the main purposes of the farmer's organization is to aid farmers in obtaining their just and fair share of the national income. That it is necessary for the members of the board of directors to compromise in order to reach goals for a unified agriculture program when they are planning a national Legislature.

"While we in the Southern region feel that the present program may not be designed to give us our fair share of the national income," said the speaker, "we can only lose by throwing up our hands and refusing membership to build a strong organization. Our future lies in a strong membership."

"Our goal in Chowan County is 400 members for the 1954 fall drive. We can only make a touchdown by contacting the people and getting the membership. The people must be informed and it is the responsibility of every Farm Bureau member to try to keep himself greatly informed and to inform his neighbor as to what the Farm Bureau organization is doing. Let's get them."

President Perry passed out the membership cards and information leaflets to the workers who were present. The plan is to cover the major part of the drive as quickly as possible. Mr. Perry urges every farmer to think carefully and realize the value of a national organization organization. "The \$4.00 membership fee is negligible," he said. "Surely every farm family spends far more than that for many things that they don't necessarily have to. Yet \$4.00 may help maintain your farm organization for a definite purpose and should not be overlooked. If the workers in your community or membership do not contact you, you contact them."

Hunters Urged To Be Careful In Woods

County Ranger Frank White Says Woods Are Very Dry

All persons who plan to be in the woods hunting are urged to take all the necessary precautions to prevent fires from starting as a result of careless smoking habits or unguarded warming fires. County Ranger Frank V. White urges. The woods are very dry now and any fire that gets out of control is hard to stop without a big loss resulting. The peat soil is dry enough to burn now in addition to the inflammable material on top of the forest floor, so every precaution should be taken to keep fires from getting out of control.

County Ranger White said that he hoped that the people in Chowan County will cooperate by keeping wild fire out of the woods. It will not be necessary for the N. C. Division of Forestry to request that the Governor close the woods to all hunting, fishing, and trapping if everyone is careful with their use of fire while in or near the woods. It will be necessary to make this request if too many fires result from hunters, and the fire danger increases as a result of the

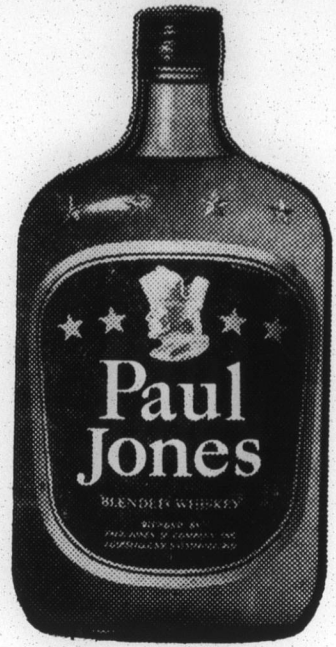
