Chowan County Ranger Frank V White announces that the Department of Conservation and Development, Division of Forestry's Pest Control Forester, R. L. Scheer, has asked him to point out the danger of insect infestations in pine timber which was damaged by Hurricane Hazel.

Due to the considerable quantity of timber which was blown down, there is a strong possibility that bark beetles will build up to large numbers next spring and summer if there is another dry growing season. The pri-
