47 Counties Show Increased Sales Tax

Sales tax collections for October in 47 North Carolina counties were greater than for the same month in 1953, according to State Revenue Department figures tabulated by the N. C. Merchants Association.

Chowan County was not among the 47 counties showing increased business over October a year ago.

Sales tax collections in the State for October were \$1,776,535.09 as compared with \$1,490,506.02 for September, an increase of more than six per cent.

Total collections for all areas in October were less than one per cent short of the 1953.

"All signs point to one of the best autumn seasons on record," said Thompson Greenwood, executive secretary of the merchants' organization.

Burial was in the Macedonia Baptist Church graveyard.

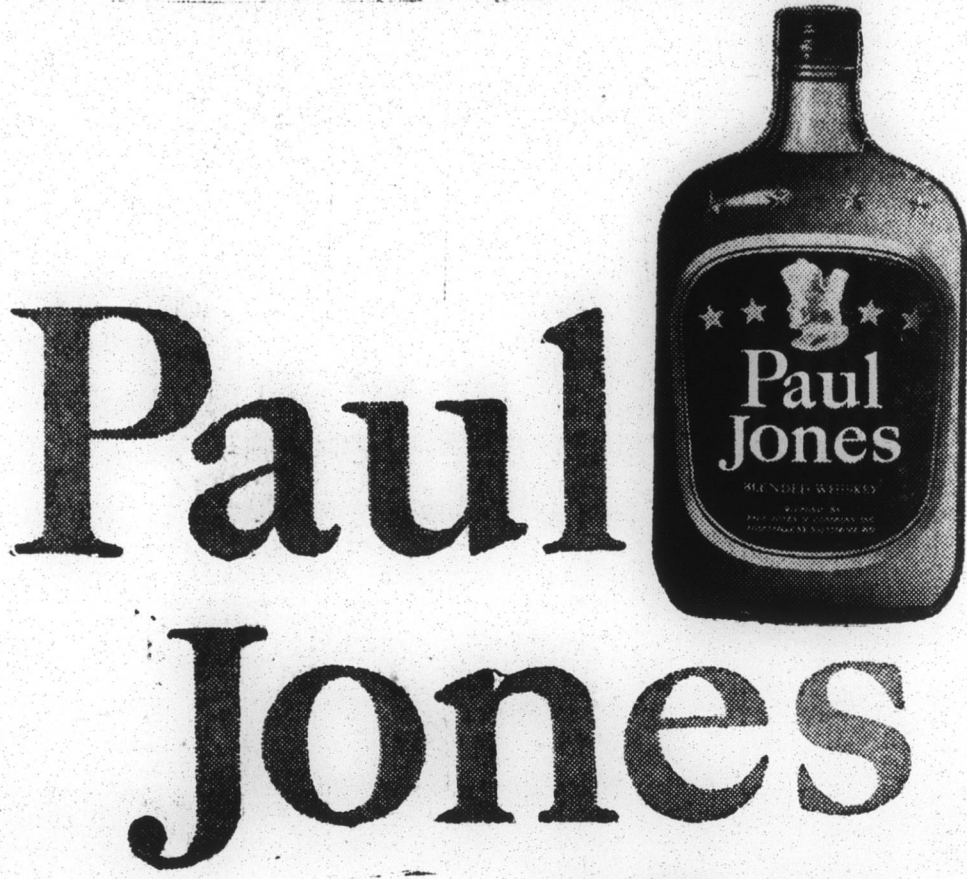
