Actually-all humorous exaggerations to one side -the typical American service station knows no su-periors and few equals. It is symbolic of our highly competitive oil industry in particular-and of our free system of doing things in general. The contrast with the service stations in most other countries is striking. When the retired president of the Automotive Safety Foundation returned from a Europear motor trip last summer he was asked about the foreign stations, and he said: "Nobody wiped my windshield or checked my oil. They have simply never heard of such a thing as service over there. What do you mean, were the rest rooms clean? They never heard of rest rooms . . As for the TBA---as we call tires, batteries and accessories sales-they never heard of that either."


