low is about six feet high, with a canopy of curved wood above something like the top of a gable end of a gothic house. I must mention the old colonial hall, in which hangs the same old lamp that gave light to those of olden times, the mahogany carved winding stairway—the steps are worn from use and old age—the old clock that has stood in one corner of the dining room for 132 years which was bought by Dr. Samuel Dickinson who, sent by Parson Pettigrew to London for it, where he went for ordination. On the mantel is a very historical picture of the overthrow of the Tea in the Boston Harbor, which took place in the year 1773. Near the "Tea Picture" is Dr. Dickinson's Coat of Arms.

In the year 1908, Miss Margaret Bond celebrated with a Silver Tea Party, the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the home. There were present one hundred and fifty guests.

In the year 1909 the Sons of Cincinnati met in this home. St. Mary's Guild, a Society of the Episcopal Church in Edenton, furnished them with a Luncheon. It was an enjoyable occasion.

The Daughters of the Revolution gave a Luncheon December 5th, 1910, in the Cupola House which was enjoyed by all present. The address, by Miss Hinton, was very instructive and interesting.

Dr. Dickinson's office was where the corner store on the lot stands. He was associated with a young Dr. Bensley. The doctors in those days did not have the adequate pharmaceutical preparation, or the skilled druggists as now, but compounded and dispensed their own medicines. The favorite prescription here in those days for the malarial fevers was "half pint Chamomile tea every morning on an empty stomach." Quinine was unknown to the world then, though the Peruvian Bark had been introduced some time by the Jesuits. Dr. Dickinson was a distinguished physician and was often called in consultation to Norfolk and met his death from exposure in crossing the sound to see some member of the Armistead family.

Some of the Suburb that Dr. Dickinson used is still in the home, and the scales for weighing the medicines.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
By Mary Lee Taylor
Toasted Marshmallow Custard
8 marshmallows 1 cup Per Evaporated
2 slightly beaten eggs 1/2 cup water
1/2 cup granulated sugar 2/3 cup water
Few grains salt 1 teaspoon vanilla
Use 4 custard cups holding about 3/4 cup each. Put 2 marshmallows into each cup. Mix well in a bowl the eggs, sugar and salt. Stir in milk, water and vanilla. Pour mixture on top of marshmallows in cups. Set cups into fat pan holding 1 inch of hot water. Bake in a 325 oven (low moderate) until knife inserted near edge of custard comes out clean, or about 40 minutes. Cool.
