## N. C. Business Firms **Receive Forms For 1954 Census Report**

Report forms of the 1954 Census f Business are being mailed to North Carolina retail, wholesale and service businesses, theaters and other amusement places, hotels and tourist courts, early in January by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce. The report forms are adapted to the various kinds of business and smaller firms need answer only a minimum of basic inquiries.

Approximately three million business firms throughout the United States will receive the 1954 census forms. Information collected in the ensus is confidential and will be used by the Bureau of the Census in compiling new statistics on business activities for the nation, states and smaller areas for the first time since the results of the 1948 Census of Business were published.






