

### Workers' Council To Sponsor 'Green Pasture' Program

#### Goal Is Good Pasture For Livestock on Every Farm

At their February meeting the Chowan County Agriculture Workers' Council accepted the "Green Pastures Program" for 1955. Tentative committees were selected. The "Green Pastures Program" is an effort to get every farmer to establish and maintain adequate good pasture for the livestock on the farm. The farmers citation award will be made to each farmer who maintains and properly manages one acre of good pasture for each animal unit on the farm. An honor farm plaque will be awarded to each farmer who maintains one and a half acres of good pasture for each animal unit.

"Good pastures is one of our cheapest foods for livestock," says C. W. Overman. "In striving to meet the goals of the 'Green Pastures Program' farmers will be making cheaper and better livestock gains and the honors attained by individuals and the county will be good recognition for success."

### Local Police Arrest 58 During January

According to Chief of Police George I. Dail, Edenton police made 58 arrests in January. Miscellaneous traffic violations led the list with 30, followed next by drunks with six arrested.

Of those arrested 49 were found guilty as charged. The arrests were 41 white males, four white females, 12 colored males and one colored female.

Fines amounted to \$245 and costs \$197.75, or a total of \$442.75, of which amount \$209.80 was turned back to the town in way of officers' fees.

Activities during the month included 70 calls answered, three accidents investigated, one stolen automobile reported, 20 street lights reported out, 54 courtesies extended, nine doors found unlocked, 60 investigations made, six fire calls answered, and 605 citations issued. The police made 684 radio calls and were on the air 57 minutes.

### Marines Collect \$671.50 For Local March Of Dimes

#### Check Is Presented By Col. M. K. Peyton, C. O. of Base

Clark A. Warner, VMA-211; First Lieut. Stanley G. Radhuber, H&MS-14; Chaplain Dean K. Veltman, MABS-14, and Second Lieut. Kenneth Casey, VMA-225.

At the presentation Col. Peyton expressed his pleasure at the "cooperation between the citizens of Edenton and Marine personnel, especially for such a worthy cause as the March of Dimes." He liked to think of ALF Edenton and the City of Edenton as "one community... helping one another."

#### For Lift That Lasts Drink Milk Each Day

Today, for economy's sake use dry milk in addition to fresh milk. It's a good "buyword" for smart food shoppers because it's a wholesome dairy product from which only the water and cream are removed.

Nonfat dry milk is a good buy because it helps to stretch your food dollar. It's easy to keep on hand and is especially convenient for the person living alone, for small families, and for families where everyone works away from home. Dry milk is handy if you are vacationing away from a good source of fresh milk. It's also a refrigerator space saver since it can be kept on the cupboard shelf and reconstituted as needed. It gives you needed minerals, B vitamins and protein.

You'll find that you can add extra milk solids to various cooked

dishes to help bring diets up to daily requirements. This is especially important in dishes for older people and for children who refuse to drink as much milk as they need.

Make a point of looking for non-fat dry milk in your grocery store. It's a good way of getting more milk in your family's diet.

**Soup As Good As It Looks**—Families around the world think of the soup kettle as a symbol of home and pleasant hours together.

Soup must look as good as it tastes, and taste as good as it looks. Whether it is served in china cups, in pottery bowls, or from a copper chafing dish, hot soup should be served piping hot.

Garnishes add eye appeal, flavor, and texture contrast. Here are some popular garnishes for soup: Whipped cream, chopped parsley, croutons, lemon slices, crisp cereals, frankfurter slices. Perhaps you think of others.

In planning soup meals, think of the ingredients in the soup and plan to complete a nutritious meal. Perhaps you would like to try these two recipes for special soups, some you can fix in ten minutes time—will serve 4.

**Cheese Soup:** 1 cup condensed cream of mushroom soup, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 cup shredded sharp cheese, dash black pepper. Combine all ingredients in saucepan. Heat, stirring constantly, until cheese is melted.

### 125 Given Old Age Aid In January

According to the monthly report of Mrs. J. H. McMullan, Chowan County Welfare Superintendent, 125 persons in Chowan County received \$3,189 for old age assistance. Eleven aid to dependent children cases received \$416, while 11 aid to blind cases received \$406 and 13 aid to permanently and totally disabled cases received \$470.

General assistance in the amount of \$180.11 was given in 11 cases and other financial assistance included three cases hospitalized in the county, \$99; two cases hospitalized outside the county, \$37.20; one medical case, \$4.85; one burial, \$25.

Service cases included three persons receiving veterans rehabilitation in cooperation with the Department of Public Welfare, four persons receiving free eye examinations through the N. C. State Commission for the Blind, and 12 children receiving individual service.

#### COUNTY DEBT REDUCED

W. W. Byrum, Chairman of the Chowan County Commissioners, was authorized Monday to pay \$9,610.49 on the county's indebtedness. The amount represents \$2,129.81 due March 1 and \$7,480.68 due March 15.

Both amounts are for school building bonds and coupons.

#### C. C. WIGGINS ASSIGNED TO EDENTON MARINE BASE

C. C. Wiggins has been transferred to the Edenton Marine Corps Auxiliary Landing Field, where he has been assigned as assistant to Chief Inspector Ralph R. Hall. Mr. Wiggins reported for his new position last week. He had been working at Little Creek, Va.
