## John A. Holmes Pi Chapter Speaker At Elizabeth City

### Presents Urgent Need For Teachers In Schools

John A. Holmes, Superintendent of Edenton's City Schools, and Northeastern Albemarle's outstanding educator, addressed Pi Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society at a luncheon meeting held at the Virginia Dare Hotel in Elizabeth City on Saturday, February 12, at which time he spoke forcefully of the present urgent need of "Teacher Recruitment" and of the educational crisis due to the shortage of qualified classroom teachers throughout the nation.

Mr. Holmes, quoting from the National Education Association statistics, stressed the great concern of the association because of the present situation, which has been created by the lack of teachers preparing in colleges to enter the teaching profession. Statistics show that 165,000 teachers are needed in the Elementary Schools alone and at the present time, only 35,000 teachers are being trained to fill these vacancies. "In the high schools, 50,000 teachers are needed," said Mr. Holmes. "And if one-half of that number can be found to take over the job of educating the youth of our country, we will be lucky."

"From 1951 to 1953, there was an increased enrollment in the public schools of three million children and in 1953 and 1954, the replacements of teachers from the first through the sixth grades amounted to over 60,000 teachers," concluded the speaker. Mr. Holmes was introduced by Mrs. Mary L. Browning.

Prior to Mr. Holmes' talk, Mrs. Shelton Hill introduced Mesdames Matthew Weeks, Clay Forebee, Edwin Ayldott and Miss Ethel Jones, who highlighted the luncheon hour with an enjoyable musical program.

Other luncheon guests were Mrs. Alice Baum of Brookfield, N. J., and Miss Ruth Hoyle of Elizabeth City; Mrs. Rose P. Goodwin, a member of the Chapter, but now living in Greenville, S. C., was also present. Miss Sue Underhill of Plymouth, formerly of Lumberton, was welcomed as a member of Pi Chapter by transfer from Lambda chapter.

Miss Ethel Perry, Pi Chapter president, presided over the business session at which time she stressed a good attendance to the State meeting to be held at Pinehurst in late April. Miss Gladys Norris read a memorial to one of the Chapter's recently departed members, Mrs. Gladys C. Chaffin. A moment of silent prayer was observed for her.

The president stated that recommendations for membership into the chapter should be discussed and voted on at the next meeting, which will be held in Edenton in early April with the Edenton group as hostesses.

The Elizabeth City members, with Miss Gladys Norris assisting, were hostesses at a delightful coffee hour on the mezzanine floor of the hotel before the business session. It was regretted that several members were unable to attend Saturday's meeting because of illness.


