

### Survey Of Parents Is In Progress For Using Polio Vaccine

#### Program Depends Upon Receipt of Salk Vaccine Here

Chowan County schools are conducting a survey of parents of first and second graders pertaining to the use of Salk Vaccine, for the prevention of polio, providing this serum is made available here. This survey is being conducted in cooperation with the District Health Department. If the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis puts the final stamp of approval on the Salk polio vaccine, North Carolina plans

to use it this spring. The vaccine, contingent upon its being licensed for administration by the National Institute of Health, is expected to be available for distribution during April.

Dr. J. W. R. Norton, state health officer, said recently, "We have high hopes that this vaccine will work; therefore, we are making full plans for a vaccine program so that we will be prepared to move immediately into action if we get the green light."

In connection with these plans, upon the request of parents the vaccine will be administered to first and second grade children, if the vaccine is made available to this county, and parents who have received letters concerning this matter are requested to return the letters to the schools advising school officials of their attitude toward the use of the vaccine.

#### 4-H Clubs Observe National 4-H Week

Peanut contests sponsored by the Edenton Lions Club and Rotary Club, respectively, are always highlights of the year's 4-H Club work.

The County Elimination Day was the first of its kind held in the Eastern District, and was a very successful event. It was an all-day affair, with demonstrations galore, public speaking contest, talent contest, dress review, health pageant, and a tractor operator's contest. Dinner was served on the grounds to the 200 club members, parents and local leaders who attended. Demonstrations by the boys included forestry tree planting, soil and water conservation, vegetable production, electric, and livestock conservation. Demonstrations by the girls were: dairy foods (individual and team), electric, and vegetable preparation.

A review of the project work by Chowan 4-H members shows that 105 boys completed 119 projects. These included 35 corn, 23 peanuts, 2 soybeans, 5 cotton, 1 tobacco, 12 garden, 1 soil and water conservation, 5 forestry, 5 wildlife, 6 poultry, 4 beef cattle, 9 swine, 1 rabbit, 1 entomology, 3 tractor maintenance, 2 electric and 4 beautification of home grounds. One hundred nineteen girls completed 159 projects, 5 electric, 3 home grounds beautification, 62 food preparation, 17 canning and preserving food, 4 freezing food, 54 clothing, 4 home management, 15 home furnishings, and 5 home industrial arts and

crafts. The local clubs, of which there are five, met once a month at the homes of local leaders or the various club members. Local leaders held many of the meetings when the Extension Agents could not be present. Three local clubs, Advance, Enterprise and Ryland, had exhibits at the Chowan County Fair. The County Council also had an exhibit there. Local 4-H leaders who have been extremely active and helpful in Chowan 4-H work are: Mrs. H. H. Lane, Mrs. M. C. Copeland, Ryland Club; Mrs. J. W. Morris, Cannon's Ferry Club; Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Goodwin, Jr., Enterprise Club; Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis Skinner and Mr. and Mrs. Bristol Perry, Advance Club; and Mrs. Tom Asbell, Center Hill.

Ida Ann Blanchard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ellsworth Blanchard of Ryland, was district winner in the Individual Dairy Foods Contest, and Evangeline Copeland and Mary Sue Elliott were district winners of the Team Dairy Foods Demonstration. They are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Copeland and Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Elliott, respectively, of the Ryland community.

A 4-H Talent group (string instrumentalists) consisting of Leon Priovott, Sammy Byrum, Stuart Hollowell and Britton Byrum were district winners in talent. Kay F. White was also district winner in talent. She gave a skit entitled "A Country Girl's First Trip to Town."

Carlton Perry, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bristol Perry of Advance community, was district winner in the 4-H Cotton contest. He was awarded a free trip to a 4-H Cotton School at State College by the Plant Foods Industry. He was also awarded a \$25 Defense Bond.

Jackie Morris and Shirley Harrell were district and state winners in the 4-H Electric Demonstration Contest, sponsored by Rural Electrification Corporation. Shirley was territorial winner of the electric project and won a \$100 college scholarship to East Carolina College, where she is a freshman. Jackie Morris won second place territorial award and was presented a \$50 gold watch by the Virginia Electric and Power Company who also awarded the scholarship to Shirley.

The Chowan 4-H Club members are proud of their organization and are working harder than ever to live up to their motto, "To Make the Best Better."
