Due to circulation of rumors, Col. M. K. Each Voter Must Register In Order to **Cast Ballots**

Voters in Edenton are reminded that a new registration has been called, so that in order to cast a ballot in the forthcoming municipal election on May 3 and future elections names must appear on the new registration book in each of the four wards. Regardless of how long a voter has been voting, he or she must register again in order to be eligible to vote.

The new registration was called y Town Council due to the deplorble condition of the present registration books which contain names of voters long since dead, some who have moved away and many appearing in one ward while the voter has moved to another ward.

The registration books will be open Saturday, April 9, and will lose at sunset Saturday, April 23. During this period voters may regster at the home of registrars any day except Sunday until sunset, exept that on each Saturday the egistrars will be stationed at the arious polling places from 9 A.
